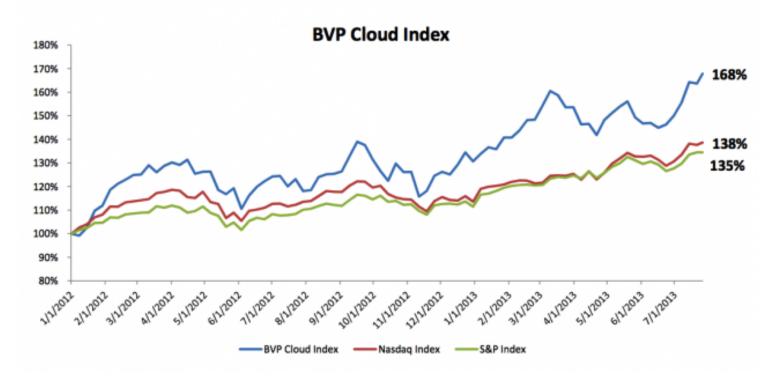
2012 Spending (in \$billions)

Another example of democratizing development

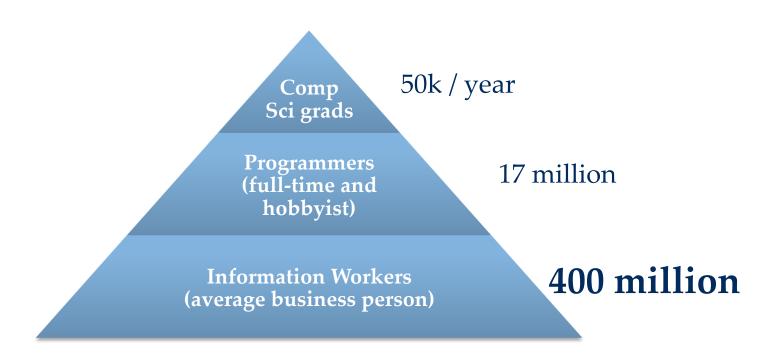




- Consumer flow one click to set up

Why are developer businesses so attractive?



- Low hurdle to adoption
- Organic usage drives the business
- Marketing covers sales and support initially
 - Drives better conversion eg, Sendgrid support
 - Sales comes later
- Social media is an accelerant (<u>developers talk a lot</u>)

- Very sticky and hard to rip out
- Economies of scale you can get better prices than your customers
- Net negative churn: as customers' usage grow, so does your revenue
