## What is business development?

Business development is a function to give and get value from a broader ecosystem of companies that share a common goal



## Early-Stage Partnership Types

Channel	Technology	Strategic

## First Step - Goal Setting



Focus on revenue, users, or new technology.

### Example:

Our startup business development goal is to <u>land new</u> <u>customers</u> through a <u>channel</u> <u>partnership</u>.

We will measure this through the total <u>number of leads</u> <u>generated</u> within <u>3 months from</u> <u>the launch of the partnership.</u>

## Example -B2B2C Startup

**MRR:** Grow from \$2K to \$10K (5X)

Timeframe: 6-9 months

**Tactics:** Go to the top 2-3 verticals for the product then close the top partners. Partners will all have a captive audience and be able to deploy as fast as possible.

Example: Sports Betting Industry Vertical – create a pipeline of10-15 top partners. See how many active users that will be committed by the partner via an LOI.

Additional Verticals: Hospitality - Retail & QSR Space.

## Things to do *today*

Goal	<ul> <li>What goal could you achieve through business development that you cannot achieve as a team today?</li> <li>Revenue, Users, New Technology?</li> <li>How will the goal be measured?</li> <li>What's the timeframe? (Weeks, months, years)</li> </ul>	
Research	<ul> <li>Speak to customers</li> <li>Look at pipeline</li> <li>Competitors of your competitors</li> </ul>	
Evaluation	<ul> <li>Prioritization Exercise</li> <li>Speak with references such as other partners or customers</li> </ul>	
Outreach	<ul> <li>Get involved in the ecosystem</li> <li>Leverage tools such as LinkedIn, job listings, partner's press releases to determine stakeholders</li> <li>Cold emails, warm intro's</li> </ul>	

### Minimum Viable Partnerships



Build a list and assume that you'll get a low hit rate Know going in what could take drag a deal on or move a deal forward

Be prepared to go back to your list and move other partners when a deal is stalled

#### **Email Template for Startup BD Outreach**

Now you've created your business development strategy so you are ready to start reaching out to potential partners. Below is a short guide on how to structure an effective outreach email. Do

- Open to build as much credibility as possible
- Mention a mutual customer or group of users if possible
   Keen it short and concise
- Drive home the action of a meeting/call
  Don't

Be vague

- Long-winded and open-ended
- Unclear on next steps Spray and pray – 2 or 3 cold emails to the same company max

Section	Length	
Opening – Title and what the company does in a few short words. "I'm the CEO of and we do for"	1 sentence	
Build Credibility – Include any Impressive growth metrics, or mutual customers. Talk about the team	2-3 sentences	
Short Partnership Proposal – Be short here and remember that you want them to take action. The whole proposal should not be put up front.	1-2 sentences	
Ask – Always end with a call to action of either setting a meeting or asking what further information might be needed. I also include an ask to be pointed to the right person if the recipient is not the appropriate person to move the partnership forward. Source: https://dalee.me/business-de	1 sentence

When to evaluate exiting a partnership

### Before Partnership

- Repeated Missed Deadlines
- Lack of alignment on the "what"

### • After Partnership

- Lower-than-expected customer value
- Higher-than-expected lift
- Point-of-contact/stakeholder turnover
- Think about the "two-way door" concept here!

## Making the First BD Hire – From 0 to 1

### Timing

### • Proactive

- Significant partner opportunity identified by nature of the product
- Reactive
  - Early sales efforts uncover partner opportunity
  - Significant founder time dedicated to partner management and sourcing

### Responsibilities

- Developing pipeline of partners
- Management of existing partnerships
- Stakeholder management
- Coordination of "Lift" efforts across the startup

### Qualities

- Analytical
- Relationship-driven
- Comfortable getting deep into the industry
- Cross-functional
- Project Manager

### Resume

- Consistent track record of closing deals with numbers to show for it
- Early-career with analytical background or experience in channel
- Mid-career and has scaled BD programs
- Legal/Contract review experience
- C-Level Exposure and Composure

Cash

Program fees & sponsorships for various partnerships can range from \$100 to \$10,000+ in annual costs

### Questions to ask:

What is the hard cost of the partnership?

Are there additional opportunities to be present in the partners ecosystem and how much will those opportunities cost?



## Marketing

Need for assets and strategy to be developed around co-marketing.

### **Questions to ask:**

What commitments do you make on comarketing with partners? What do we need to do to unlock co-marketing opportunities?

What assets or collateral will be needed on a monthly, quarterly, or annual basis to hit marketing goals?



## Sales/GTM

Teams and incentives need to be aligned to acquire customers/users.

### Questions to ask:

Will someone on the sales team be able to support partner-driven leads?

Will the partner need incentives to drive co-selling either through pipeline sharing or compensation?



## Integration

The efforts needed to both launch and continue to support the partnership.

### Questions to ask:

What type of development or integration effort is needed to launch the partnership? And to maintain the partnership?
