EHRN launches new gender project

The Eurasian Harm Reduction Network (EHRN) together with the Harm Reduction Knowledge Hub is happy to announce the start of the new one year project which will address women, girls and gender equality issues in HIV related and harm reduction services. Goal of the project is to improve the capacity of the Harm Reduction Knowledge Hub and its partners to provide technical assistance to countries in Eastern Europe and Central Asia to improve access to HIV prevention, treatment, care and support services by women who inject drugs. It is planned that the results of the project will be accessible for organizations working on women and gender issues in Eastern Europe and Central Asia. Tools, reports and guidelines within the project will be developed with the support and coordination of Harm Reduction Knowledge Hub of EHRN. Furthermore two target countries will be selected for the project roll out.

Study visits of experts from Central Asia to Lithuania and Portugal organized by EHRN

In December 2009 the Eurasian Harm Reduction Network (EHRN) with the support of AIDS Control Project in Central Asia organized two study visits for experts from Central Asia to Lithuania and Portugal. The first visit was aimed at providing health care workers and supervisors of opioid substitution threapy (OST) programs necessary knowledge about methadone pharmacotherapy in the context of a comprehensive treatment of addiction and disease prevention. Visit was implemented in partnership with the Vilnius Center for Addictive disorders. Training was conducted on a base of the training manual "Substitution Treatment" prepared by the Harm Reduction Knowledge HUB (EHRN). During the study tour participants also visited several local agencies and projects, including "Blue outreach bus" and project of the Vilnius government on vocational training for former drug users - cafe "Mano Guru".

Orientation visit to Portugal on December 14-18, 2009 was designed specifically for public officials of the countries of Central Asia. The participants of the visit were members of parliaments, representatives of high-level health officials and staff of <u>AIDS Control Project in Central Asia</u>. Participants were introduced to the Portuguese strategy and practices in the field of drug policy and HIV/AIDS. The approach of the

European Union to harm reduction was presented during a visit to the European Monitoring Center on Drugs and Drug Addiction (EMCDDA). Participants also had the opportunity to get acquainted with the practice of sharing needles and syringes through pharmacies, drug policy and HIV/AIDS programmes in prisons and visited the clinic of integrated care, as well as NGOs, that provide mobile services for substitution therapy programs. Participants noted that exchange of experiences between the various programs within the health system of Portugal (for example, the use of the tuberculosis programs when developing programs for HIV/AIDS) is very important for countries of Central Asia.

At least two Central Asian countries are currently discussing legislation on drugs. Drug policy attracts less attention in comparison to HIV policy. Five areas of the Portuguese drug policy, as well as a systematic approach to combat drug trafficking, including multi-sectoral collaboration and quality monitoring system and the impact of policies, can be used in the countries of Central Asia. Integrated and accessible drug treatment programs may be carried out in Central Asia. This could help to support harm reduction programs, especially programs of opioid substitution therapy, which are about to begin in Tajikistan (and had already begun in Kyrgyzstan and Kazakhstan).

Polish Government signs recommendations to scale up OST access in prisons

On December 10, 2009, during the conference co-hosted by the Polish Penitentiary Service, the Social AIDS Committee and Open Society Institute's Global Drug Policy Program recommendations to improve access to opioid substitution treatment (OST) in Polish prisons were signed by the Polish Government. The recommendations are a follow-up to a round table which took place in May, attended by Poland's Minister of Justice, past and present Penitentiary Service directors, politicians, physicians, and NGO representatives.

The signing of these recommendations represents a major step forward in addressing OST scale up in Poland. Currently, only around 5% of opiate dependent persons in the country receive substitution treatment and in most cases OST is not offered in prison or detention facilities. Earlier in 2009 the UN Special Rapporteur on the Right to Health emphasized the need to improve access to substitution treatment after his visit in Poland. Similar recommendations for Poland were provided last month by ECOSOC.

One more methadone maintenance therapy center opened in Albania

On December 15, 2009 a new methadone maintenance (MMT) center was opened in the town of Vlora, South-west Albania. Vlora is town heavily affected by drug use and local authorities expressed their support to the establishment of the center. Currently this project is financed by UNICEF and supported by GFATM. The center will also provide education for young people in high schools, as well as a friendly space where young people can be tested for HIV and other STIs. Break the Cycle intervention, which aims to reduce the number of people who begin injecting, has also been introduced in the new MMT center.

At the moment 17 clients receive treatment in Vlora and their number is expected to grow. A doctor, social worker and psychologist work in the center. Currently there are 4 MMT centers run by AksionPlus across Albania: in Tirana, Durres, Korca and Vlora. Both centers in Vlora and Korca have been opened in 2009. Almost 250 injecting drug users were provided with opioid substitution therapy last year in Albania.

Events on the occasion of World AIDS day in Eastern and Central Europe and Central Asia Source: AFEW, EHPV, Victoria Ashirova

December 5, 2009

On <u>World AIDS Day</u>, December 1, 2009 throughout Central and Eastern Europe and Central Asia variety of events took place with the aim to draw public attention to the spread of HIV in the region and discuss methods for stemming the epidemic and raising public awareness.

Red Ribbon Awards ceremony organised by <u>UNAIDS</u> and the <u>World AIDS Campaign</u> to honour some of the most innovative and effective campaigns in HIV prevention and activism took place in Chishinau, Moldova. Nominations were submitted for the best organisations in ten categories.

On December 4, 2009 <u>AIDS Foundation East-West (AFEW)</u> organised a roundtable on the observation of the human rights and personal freedoms of clients when implementing prevention programmes, as well as the implications of this issue for the HIV epidemic in Ukraine. At the same time, an exhibition on the theme 'Living Stories' and a mini-exhibition of informational and educational materials have been held in Moscow, Russia.

Activists of Estonian Network of People living with HIV organized free HIV express testing in Tallin, Estonia. Together with doctors from the Central Hospital of Infectious Diseases they co-lighted the ribbon of tolerance.

Eventually, in Uzbekistan a high-level Round Table meeting including representatives of Government took place. The reports about HIV/AIDS situation in the country were presented by Minister of Health, Minister of Education, director of the Republican AIDS Center, chairman of the youth movement Kamolot and others.

The estimated number of people living with HIV in Eastern Europe and Central Asia is 1.5 million and keeps rising, with severe and growing epidemics in Ukraine and Russian Federation. Estonia, Russian Federation and Ukraine have HIV prevalence that exceeds 1%. Ukraine has the highest prevalence in all of Europe. A number of countries have expanded access to antiretroviral therapy, although according to UNAIDS, the treatment coverage remains quite low.

Russian Drug Policy Strategy: syringe exchange is a risk

On December 28, 2009, the Russian State Anti-drug Committee submitted for adoption to the President of the Russian Federation a <u>Draft Strategy of the National Anti Drug Policy</u>, which includes controversial statements and omissions that threaten the future of HIV prevention among injecting drug users (IDUs) in Russia. Among key objectives the initial draft of the strategy indicated "implementing measures to prevent introduction of harm reduction programs, including substitution treatment", however after consultation with the public this provision has been removed. Nonetheless, the Strategy still considers substitution treatment and syringe exchange a risk and equates the latter with drug propaganda.

The strategy and related feedback from the public was discussed at the meeting of the Government Drug Committee on December 15, 2009. <u>Eurasian Harm Reduction Network (EHRN)</u> and <u>Russian Harm Reduction Network (RHRN)</u> have provided their comments to the Strategy, however interestingly in a number of cases it was not possible to submit them on the website due to "technical problems".

Project of strategy was submitted for approval by the President of Russian Federation and in the first quarter of 2010 governors and heads of anti-drug commissions of subjects of Russia will have to elaborate local strategic plans to be added to the strategy.

Day care centers for HIV+ children to be opened in Uzbekistan

In November 2009, the project of day care centers for children and families affected by HIV was launched by National Association of Non-governmental and Non-commercial organizations in Uzbekistan. The project is the continuation of the AIDS Control Project in Central Asia, which has previously supported the opening of the first day care center "Kaldirgoch" for children living with HIV in Tashkent. Regional AIDS centers will provide basis for new day care centers to be opened in regions most affected by HIV in 2010. The aim of the project is to provide non-medical assistance for children living with HIV and their family members. The project is supported by UNICEF.

Lifting the U.S. Ban on federal funding for syringe exchange is a victory for public health By: Simona Merkinaite, EHRN

December 17, 2009

In a major change to the country's drug policy, the United States Congress has reversed a ban on federal funding of needle exchange that was first enacted 21 years ago. The legislation change was signed by President Barack Obama on December 17, 2009 and will allow funding of needle exchange programs domestically, as well as internationally through United States Agency for International Development (USAID) and the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), the world's largest single source of HIV/AIDS-related funding.

Starting in 2010, <u>USAID</u> and <u>PEPFAR</u> are expected to fund needle exchange internationally as part of programs aimed at comprehensive HIV prevention among injecting drug users. Such funding could bring new money for HIV prevention programs to Eastern European and Central Asian countries where USAID is active.

UNITAID approves breakthrough plan to make AIDS treatment more widely available at lower cost Source: <u>UNITAID</u>
December 15, 2009

On December 14, 2009 <u>UNITAID</u> Executive Board made a landmark decision to establish a Patent Pool for AIDS medicines. The pool, scheduled to start operating in mid-2010, aims to make newer medicines available in patient-adapted form, at lower prices, for low- and middle-income countries. <u>UNITAID</u> has committed to provide start-up funds of up to \$4 million USD over the next year. Expected savings exceed one billion dollars a year, which will make more medicines available for more people.

WHO issues new HIV recommendations to improve health, reduce infections and save lives Source: WHO

On the eve of the <u>World AIDS Day</u>, <u>WHO</u> released new recommendations on treatment, prevention and infant feeding in the context of HIV, based on the latest scientific evidence. <u>WHO</u> now recommends earlier initiation of antiretroviral therapy (ART) for adults and adolescents, the delivery of more patient-friendly antiretroviral drugs (ARVs), and prolonged use of ARVs to reduce the risk of mother-to-child transmission of HIV. For the first time, <u>WHO</u> recommends that HIV-positive mothers or their infants take ARVs while breastfeeding to prevent HIV transmission.

The main challenge lies in increasing the availability of treatment in resource-limited countries. WHO, in collaboration with key partners, will provide technical support to countries to adapt, adopt and implement the revised guidelines.

UN Leaders make statements for World AIDS Day

Various leaders from the United Nations marked the <u>World AIDS Day</u> with statements highlighting the need for sensible policies that protect vulnerable populations, and an urgent appeal for more resources to support them in the face of the global financial crisis.

At the launch of the <u>Commission on AIDS in the Pacific</u> report on 2nd December, the United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon <u>said (click here for full speech)</u>, that "There can be no effective response to AIDS as long as some parts of the population are marginalized and denied basic health and human rights. This includes people living with HIV, sex workers, men who have sex with men, and injecting drug users".

Also on the 1st December, Michel Sidibé – Executive Director of <u>UNAIDS</u> – <u>warned (click here for full speech)</u> that the fragile fiscal situation many governments are facing is no excuse to weaken the international commitment to achieve universal access to HIV prevention, treatment, care and support. In June 2009, <u>UNAIDS</u> released a report entitled <u>The Global Economic Crisis and HIV Prevention and Treatment Programmes: Vulnerabilities and Impact</u>, which revealed that programs aimed at HIV prevention among high-risk groups in 34 countries were negatively affected by the global economic crisis.

China executes mentally ill British drug offender

A British man convicted of drug smuggling has been executed in China on December 30, 2009. The execution took place despite repeated calls from his family and the British government for clemency. Mr A. Shaikh is the first EU national to be executed in China in more than 50 years.

The execution of drug offenders is a violation of international human rights law. One of the main human rights treaties, the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), clearly states that the death penalty may only be applied to the "most serious crimes". However, the UN Human Rights Committee and the UN Special Rapporteur on Extrajudicial, Summary or Arbitrary Executions have Stated that drug offences do not constitute "most serious crimes" - making executions for such offences a violation of international human rights law.

After the War on Drugs: Blueprint for Regulation issued by Transform Drug Policy Foundation

Transform Drug Policy Foundation launched its new guide to the legal regulation of drugs 'After the War on Drugs: Blueprint for Regulation' on November 12, 2009. The guide proposes specific models of regulation for each main type and preparation of prohibited drug, coupled with the principles and rationale for doing so. Further, the book demonstrates that moving to the legal regulation of drugs is not an unthinkable, politically impossible step in the dark, but a sensible, pragmatic approach to control drug production, supply and use.

Joint WHO/Europe and European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control (ECDC) surveillance report on HIV/AIDS in the WHO European Region in 2008

Publisher: WHO, ECDC December, 2009

According to <u>HIV/AIDS</u> surveillance in <u>Europe</u> in 2008, 51 600 cases of HIV were diagnosed and reported by 48 of the 53 countries in the WHO European Region (data from Russian Federation not available). The highest rates were reported from Estonia, Latvia, Kazakhstan, Portugal, Republic of Moldova, Ukraine and UK. The report illustrates the wide diversity in the epidemiology of HIV in Europe: while in the West, the predominant transmission mode is sex between men, followed by heterosexual contact - in the East, injecting drug use remains the main mode of transmission.

To mark December 17, the International Day to End Violence against Sex Workers, the <u>Sex Workers' Rights Advocacy Network (SWAN)</u> of Central and Eastern Europe and Central Asia released its new report, <u>Arrest the Violence: Human Rights Violations Against Sex Workers in 11 Countries in Central and Eastern Europe and Central Asia</u>. The report is based on interviews with more than 200 male, female and transgender sex workers between 2007 and 2009 and chillingly documents widespread violence and discrimination against them, particularly by state actors.
