Through a mixture of presentations, short videos, break-out groups, videoed practice debates, and hand-outs, this workshop will help you to develop and practice the constructive arguments, different approaches and messaging needed to address the concerns and interests of your key audiences. It will also provide a chance for you to share your expertise with colleagues.

We hope as a result, you will find it easier to not just win the argument, but to make the new allies that we as a movement need to roll out real policy change nationally and internationally.

Workshop Structure

- 1. Short presentations by Steve Rolles, Aram Barra and Lisa Sanchez
 - How the debate around regulation fits into the wider debate
 - · Why it's important to engage now: shaping/framing the discourse for the next phase of reform
 - · Common ground approaches: using shared goals as a way of critiquing failures and exploring alternatives
 - · How to talk about regulation

2. Breakout groups

- Looking at different audiences, and how to shape messages to maximise engagement and catalyse change
- · Exploring how to address key concerns for your priority audiences

3. Feedback and discussion session

 Group decides on 2 Key Concerns for practice debates, and volunteers to argue for reform against Transform/MUCD staff
