At the 54th Ordinary Session of CICAD / OAS held in Bogotá, Colombia in 2013, the Side Event was first celebrated. Since then, the practice of holding a Side Event has continued at subsequent CICAD Meetings to date. These sessions, although not part of the CICAD Ordinary Session, are not binding for the Commission, but they certainly serve as a mechanism for learning about experiences, actions, and promising research from civil society, as well as encourage feedback and exchange of ideas. The Side Event is expected to promote and strengthen the relationship between Commissioners and civil society, strengthening the relevant discussions and subsequent actions in the framework of CICAD. The content of these sessions do not necessarily reflect the position of the OAS, or the governments and institutions that sponsor these sessions.







Drugs and Development: Prioritizing a Social Integration Approach

Introductory Reflections to the Sessions.

Every facet of the drug problem—production, trafficking and consumption—impacts development prospects for the countries of our hemisphere. Despite this link, drug and development policies tend to be formulated in isolation. For example, the drug problem is not included in the Millennium Development Goals, despite the negative impact drugs have on its key goals, such as health, life expectancy, education, employment, human rights and poverty reduction. Beyond the toll on health and family structure, the drug problem exacts high social and economic costs that affect the economy, the environment, political processes, and even the social fabric that is essential for well-functioning democracies.

These sessions are designed to facilitate future research and deepen dialogue and collaboration between the different state and civil society actors, by promoting awareness of the link between drugs and development, placing particular emphasis on social integration and continually searching for solutions,. Above all, these Sessions are meant to advance those concrete actions that exemplify this collaboration.

A vicious cycle of exclusion hinders the prospects of resilience and social reintegration. The stigma of the drug addiction or of a criminal record for consumption, trafficking or production of drugs adversely effects access to a legal and permanent employment, and the option to access various social services and public benefits. The degree of social cohesion - understood as belonging to a community of shared rights and obligations, and as a community that fully recognizes the intrinsic value of the people who constitute it - is a true barometer of the health of a society. When society is fractured by a limited sense of cohesion, the likely result is a multitude of problems. Those related to drugs undoubtedly are highly visible. Social exclusion is not only an indicator of an unfair and inequitable system, which does not provides opportunities for development, but it also doubles its effect through the stigma of the excluded as a potential problematic consumer or trafficker of illicit drugs. In these situations of conflict and tensions, in which the different elements of the drug phenomenon intersect, it is imperative to apply a wide and integral orientation that takes into account the multiple factors involved and search for solutions that preserve the quality of life and social integration of all citizens.

The participation and often the leadership of the Civil Society, is essential for progress with the drug policy. The effort to socially integrate citizens who have drug problems can be hindered by the lack of cohesion and effective coordination of the different actors involved, both from the governments and civil society. On this occasion we hope to hear from pioneers in this debate.
