

The way towards drug policy reform:

Regional perspectives from Southeast Asia and Latin America

For 50 years, drug control has focused on imposing criminal sanctions against all people involved in the drug market, hoping that harsh criminal sanctions would deter people from entering the illicit drug trade. This has led to massive prison overcrowding (in 2014, UNODC estimated that one in five people in prison had been condemned for an offence linked to illicit drug possession or trafficking) and an exacerbation of social and health harms. Although women are incarcerated at a lower rate than that of men, they are the fastest growing prison population worldwide, and their incarceration is mainly driven by drug control efforts. Most are incarcerated for micro-trafficking or personal use offences, and lived in a situation of high vulnerability prior to their incarceration. Their incarceration has had devastating impacts on their lives and that of their children and other dependents.

This side event aims to promote options for drug policy reform that aim to promote alternatives to incarceration and more proportionate sentencing for drug offences, in an effort to reduce prison overcrowding and ensure an approach based on health, human rights and social inclusion.
