## **COURSE SUMMARY**

This course will familiarise learners with different types of databases, with a focus on the relational database. This includes types of fundamental data structures, the first three stages of database normalisation, and database management systems. Learners will understand the importance of data governance and identify common sources of error within databases as well as some methods of resolution. Learners will be able to model databases and understand conceptual approaches to representing a relational database, including pictorial representations using Barker's notation.

## **COURSE AIMS**

- Teach learners to define a Relational Database and identify the three stages of normal form.
- Train learners on the importance of data standards and policies.
- Teach learners to identify common errors in database systems and how to rectify them.
- Train learners to use data modelling to represent a relational database.

#### ASSESSMENT

#### FORMATIVE

Learners will be formatively assessed during the course through a range of techniques. During Seminars, applied learning seminars and one to one coaching, questioning and quizzing are used as formative assessment. The purpose of the formative assessment is to provide learners with developmental feedback to support their learning.
