COURSE SUMMARY

In this course, learners will study the basics of data analytics and learn how to use three common tools: a spreadsheet software, standard query language (SQL), and an interactive data visualization software. The spreadsheet software will enable the learners to undertake data cleaning and exploratory data analysis to help generate insights. Learners will use SQL to extract information from a relational database management system (RDBMS) by writing increasingly complex queries, including filtering, aggregation, aliasing and subqueries. Finally, learners will use a data visualization software to perform further exploratory data analysis using a wide range of visualisation techniques. With the skills developed in this course, learners will understand how to build a dashboard and demonstrate how it creates added value within the business.

COURSE AIMS

- Train learners to use common data analysis tools to perform data cleaning, analysis, and generate insight.
- Train learners to query a relational database using SQL.
- Train learners to use effective data visualization techniques and understand their applicability in presenting insight.
