COURSE SUMMARY

This course will build on programming skills and testing approaches developed during Level 4 courses, in addition to requirements elicitation studied during Data Analysis in Industry. This course will teach learners conceptual approaches to system development, software architectures, software development management methodologies and deployment approaches. The course will cover traditional software development approaches and those available for cloud based digital transformation. The relationship between software and underlying technologies will be explored, including an appraisal of architectural options and trade offs.

COURSE AIMS

- Train learners to apply IT development lifecycles and understand their applicability to digitalisation techniques.
- Train learners to critique technology choices and understand the impact of software architectures.
- Train learners in the use of and appraisal of software design patterns.
- Train learners to develop testing strategies, including and up to deployment approaches for service management.

ASSESSMENT

FORMATIVE

Learners will be formatively assessed during the course through a range of techniques. During seminars, applied learning seminars and one to one coaching, questioning and quizzing are used as formative assessment. The purpose of the formative assessment is to provide learners with developmental feedback to support their learning.

FEEDBACK

Learners will receive formal feedback in a variety of ways. For summative assessments, feedback is written and provided within 20 days of submission, and for formative assessment it could include verbal or written feedback. Learners will also have a progress review each quarter with their Multiverse Coach and their Line Manager. These reviews are an opportunity to discuss progress to date both in their role and on the degree programme.

For summative exams, feedback is provided through generic internal examiners' reports, which are posted on the Appli.ed learning platform.
