### STEMc IUB joins forces with Darwin India to host Regional **Conference 2023**

The Darwin International Conference organized by Bioriidl, India's first DIY biolab, brings together research enthusiasts from across the world every year, providing a platform for cutting-edge research topics, talk sessions by established biologists, hands-on workshops, tours, Research Symposium, and more. STEM Community, IUB collaborated with Darwin India to organize the "Regional Conference" as part of the Darwin International Conference 2023.

The scientific talk session began with keynote speaker Darlington Akogo, founder and CEO of minoHealth, who has developed ScarffoldNet, a tool that aids in the classification of synthetic scaffolds in regenerative medicine. He talked about the use of artificial intelligence and computation in health sciences. The following keynote session was by Dr. Filipe Pereira who established cell fusion and heterokaryons as a new technique to research



cellular reprogramming mechanisms towards pluripotency during his PhD. His talk focused on anti-cancer immunotherapy where he delved into the biochemistry of how cells acquire, maintain, and ultimately change or reverse their identity.

Dr. Xavier Palmer and Dr. Lucas Potter held the third Scientific talk session, discussing their research at the intersection of Biological and Computa-Fabrication, tional and Security Research. The final panel discussion, titled "Integrated technologies and the importance of community science education for sustainable innovations,' featured Dr. Walker, a learning scientist

who focuses on the application of new computational and biological technologies in middle and high school curricula, Carolyn Angleton, a biotechnology student who organizes and moderates panels on the global community biolab movement and designs art/science curriculum protocols. and Karolina Sulich, a post-artist who investigates the relationships between people, biology, and technology in her works and promotes open science, moderated by DLS student Ashrafi Anjuman Sneha. 

# DURBIN: DUR BISSHER NAGORIK By STEMc Correspondents

Dr. Khan M. B. Asad, Assistant Professor in Astronomy and Astrophysics at Independent University, Bangladesh (IUB), spoke with STEMcIUB about the Durbin project.

The Durbin project, a joint collaboration with the University of Toronto, saw two Unistellar eVscope eQuinox Telescopes for deep sky imaging brought to IUB. The project is inspired by Dr. Lamia Maula, who is a postdoctoral research fellow at Dunlap Institute of Astronomy and Astrophysics, University of Toronto, a result of DUNLAP Institute's grant for global outreach through her Doctorate Program.

Larger telescopes allow us to detect supernova explosions but cannot make follow up observations for hours on end. Smaller more portable telescopes can be distributed to thousands of people as part of a "Citizen science" project with the collected data being analyzed by scientists allowing them to track astronomical bodies including supernova explosions from different locations on Earth.

"The eQuinox telescopes stand apart due to a combination of the mirror, sensor, and internal microcomputer, which processes the collected photos even in places with light pollution, distinguishing between skylight and light pollution. It is incredibly portable, weighing only 9kg when the tripod is added. Most galaxies must be observed from remote locations, but many within our galaxies are observable using this telescope." - shared Dr. Khan Asad.

# *"We are part of something really big, not just our Earth but our entire galaxy"*

This astronomy project provides a unique opportunity for students to gain valuable skills and experiences by traveling to remote areas and taking breathtaking photos of the night sky. Aspiring astronomers can gain a head start towards success among the stars, and 16 national volunteers will work together to plan outreach activities and capture stunning photos for sharing through various media channels. Additionally, the project aims to empower students through early exposure to research.

"National volunteers may be contacted and there can be regional volunteers to organize events all over Bangladesh or partake in the Citizen Science projects."- Said Dr Khan Asad.

On March 9th, 2023, the Dubrin project was inaugurated with a screening of the telescope screen at the IUB auditorium.

The astronomy nights shall continue and observations made by volunteers in various locations, such as the hill tracts of Chittagong, can be shared through screens online during night-long observation sessions. However, to ensure the success of this endeavor, numerous precautions must be taken. "Secure locations must be identified for overnight stays during photo-taking, as observation continuous over а prolonged period is necessary, especially for females", he said.

Apart from that to assess the success of the project, several factors must be considered, including the efficacy of outreach events and the outcome of the citizen science project. Another potential criterion is the identification of exoplanets near stars. Although this telescope is not designed for discovering new planets, it can be utilized to observe known exoplanets during their transit in front of stars. By capturing precise images of this phenomenon, the telescope's efficiency can be evaluated, as well as the suitability of the atmosphere in Bangladesh for astronomy and the optimal months for observations. After the project's completion, scientific data can be analyzed to comprehensively evaluate the project's outcomes.

All that remains to be stated following the conclusion of this conversation with Dr. Khan is that we wish this endeavor nothing less than tremendous success!

# Fab Lab IUB: Ideas to Invention

Right beneath us in the basement of IUB lies a room full of diligence, wonder, and power tools - IUB's very own FabLab in its new location. If vou're a CS major, chances are vou've heard of this hidden gem, open to all students. FabLab was started in 2018 by tech enthusiasts who just wanted a space to tinker with tools and build cool robots. Now, it has grown with its many involvements, achievements and state of the art lab facilities, and has become the go-to place for students who want to not only make something new, but also learn more through support, experience and opportunities.

With regular training sessions and workshops, the elusive world of

mechanics-electronics offers to turn ideas into creation. The last Autumn semester saw a flock of students attending workshops on electronics and robotics for their TechFest 2022 projects, and perhaps this Spring too.

Open to students even beyond IUB, FabLab boasts an impressive inventory of drilling and CNC machines, 3D printers, laser engravers, soldering equipment, woodworking power tools, and any other tools one may need. # The first 3D Bioprinter at IUB

The first ever 3D Bioprinter of Bangladesh was developed at IUB in a collaborative research by the joint efforts of Fab lab and Dept. of Life Sciences.

3D bioprinting makes it easier to create tissues in the precise shape and size needed, and because a patients' own cells can be used in the ink, the risk of rejection is also minimized.

"Our primary objective was to develop biomaterials for three dimensional bioprinting to mimic the original bioprinting process. Experiments were designed at IUB labs to check if the biomaterials promote cell binding so that it can mimic multiple biological structures with the incorporation of given cells." said Salman Promon, lecturer of DLS who is the principal investigator of this project.

Fab lab research officer Shoaib Mirza, and the involved DLS undergraduate project students Farhana Akhter and Anika Tursa have also received an award in an international bioengineering conference in 2022. Dr. Mahady Hasan, Head of the Dept. of CSE, Dean, School of Engineering, IUB, Co-PI of the project, has been keenly fostering the research and allocated resources to the continuation of the further development.

This experiment contributes to the fields of tissue engineering by enabling research on biomaterials. 3D Bioprinting shows great potential in the field of regenerative medicine.



uncle needed blood more frequently; Septicemia, I subconsciously recalled. I told my cousin it would be alright as their visits to the ICU grew more frequent and urged. I wondered as he went through several operative procedures, about how responsible he had always been with medication. My uncle had acquired the infection right after finishing the construction of his beloved new house. He would humbly break the bricks for his own walls. Somewhere along the line a strain of multi-resistant bacteria had entered his body and began to shut it down not long after he moved into his much-awaited home, meaning he received combinations upon combinations of antibiotics which ultimately failed to be effective. It wasn't just him, I heard similar accounts of multi-resistant infections related to construction throughout the hospital.

I realized it wasn't up to individuals, humans collectively contribute to the formation of drug-resistant microbes. These microorganisms rapidly adapt and grow resistant to drugs, often multiple of them, exhausting our already limited stock of antibiotics, and along with it, our hope. This isn't just constrained within our own bodies. Then, more than ever I realized, with every unprescribed antibiotic sold over the counter, every course left incomplete as soon as we feel remotely well enough, every antibiotic disposed unsafely into the environment, and with the use of antibiotics meant for humans

itting in that hospital chair, as I waited for my uncle's verdict in his fight against death. As the bacteria in his lungs resisted with all its might, I noticed more with similar stories. It's a common theme in these hospital walls, the antibiotics aren't effective. Patients of all ages suffer endlessly for various lengths of time in the Intensive Care Unit from these "superbugs" as their stressed family members pray, plead and negotiate with God and the next most powerful being in their eyes- the Doctor; The tireless attempts of whom fail to ease the despair in the hearts of these loved ones.

as a growth factor in animals, we facilitate the emergence of these resistant and multi-resistant strains of microbes that eventually cripple a hundred years of medical progress.

We all know it, but we don't understand the magnitude of the situation. There are only a few new antibiotics in progress, and market forces alone cannot meet the needs of the growing list of multi-resistant microbes in need of new drugs. Priority lists of pathogens have been constructed, and placed by WHO, as an attempt to address the urgency of the matter. However, it is limited by resources, and funds.

# Clairvoyant (Sci-Fi)

Verge, where I worked, was not big in the industry. Its employees worked on rudimentary projects. Language learning programs, tax software and all the other things that would bore most people. The cubicles, the mostly gray and beige interior design, the old building, all of it seemed dull. Though the pay was decent, and the hours were reasonable.

One day in August of 1996, we were given a project – a program to assist children and the elderly with working with computers. The job seemed quite plain to everyone, but the higher ups had a few interesting criteria; to make it as if you were communicating with a person. The term "artificial intelligence" is likely to come to mind in this case, though we weren't planning to implement anything fancy. The thing with my line of work is that the clients expect "magic" with the demands they give us. If they were dissatisfied with the product, it was just a matter of explaining that you couldn't create a person with ones and zeroes.

Over the next few weeks, we worked on this program with a surprising amount of effort. The idea was to ask questions by typing them in in plain language, and the program would reply like a person on the other end of a messaging client, like ICQ Messenger. We took reference from the conversations in movies. We processed the data into ASCII and fed it into the machine and hoped that it would spit out the right response, at the right time.

Multiple iterations of the program were created, until we were able to settle on an algorithm that didn't freeze upon slight variations in grammar. This stable build was dubbed "Claire" by our project manager and boss, Elise. Her reason being she just liked the name. She also proposed an interesting experiment: to test whether we could tell apart Claire from real people by talking to them. I was confident in the results beforehand, and it would be interesting to see as the development cycle was coming to an end.

The final phase of testing was nearing the end as well, it was my turn this week on my late-night shift...

#### On Art and Ai (Sci-Fi) By Ikram Hossain Akif

Unless you've been living under a rock, you've definitely heard of the advancements of AI generated art. You know, how certain AI-assisted services take in a few words and spit out multiple breathtaking pieces in minutes. Words to impeccable pictures. This is nothing short of the future knocking at our doorstep and taking the world by storm. But what is it anyway, how does it work, and what does it mean for the world of art?

Artificial intelligence models are commonly used in the mainstream media to refer to algorithmic systems that utilise various tools in machine learning, like neural networks, to effectively infer answers from limited information with improving accuracy. It does so by training with vast amounts of data. If the results are far from desirable, it is 'punished' with a heavy cost and is told to adjust to better align with its defined purpose. This is repeated until we get a system that learns from its errors and aligns well with our set margins of error. The essence of the 'intelligence' in AI is training on thousands of datasets for the system to learn and improve. That seems straightforward, but how do you interpret a few words to paint a picture for you? It started earlier this year with

breakthroughs from AI research lab OpenAI with their deep learning text-to-image model DALL-E. It created janky yet impressive images from text. Soon enough, this blew up with countless others following the blazing trail like Nightcafe Midjourney, and Stable Diffusion.

The image on the left was generated using Nightcafe with the prompt "student reading article". an Although sometimes producing great results. these models are far from perfect. evident from the figure's four legs, and a

face from a 2003 video game. This goes to show that these AI models do not create any art themselves, but rather take snippets from its expansive library and put together what it thinks matches with the given prompts best. Clearly then, the quality of the product depends on the art it is trained on, and how accurately it is tagged. he labelling comes from human input, organising art into boxes telling the machines what is what. Then who actually creates the art?

Well, real talented artists. The internet is home to millions of artists and their work that anyone can view. It is used to build the necessary training datasets, often without their informed consent. Their art is consumed and chopped up on an unprecedented rate by the machine to

> spew out prompted images as it learns and adapts. Such models being widely available decreases the value of creating art, hours after hours of discipline and talent poured into a single piece against a few words put into a website.

Although the results may be pleasant, it lacks the emotion and purpose conveyed by an artist (and sometimes even basic anatomy). Profit-seeking entities and businesses however only see a reduction in cost for art, and not the repercussions of AI to artists themselves. This will lead to the art industry facing a radical shift, and leaving everyone caught up figuring out what it means for copyright laws, the online footprint of your art and what makes art valuable anymore. read more at page 10

### The Compelling Mystery of the Man Behind Sherlock Holmes

Since 1887, countless have found themselves entranced by the magic woven by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle that is the world of Sherlock Holmes be it in the form of books, serieses or movies. Doesn't matter if you are team Cumberbatch or team Robert Downey Jr all we really want is to understand how Detective Holmes could carry out the investigations in such a thrilling but at the same time accurate manner? Well, for one, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle was a physician who completed his Bachelor of Medicine (M.B.), Master of surgery (C.M.) and Doctor of medicine (M.D.) from University of Edinburgh and was known for being highly logical and observant. Born in 1859, Sir Doyle revolutionized the crime investigation scene by putting forth around 60 stories of brilliant detective Sherlock Holmes

and many other works in which logic, deduction and science dominated the numerous detection methods.

The author was such a brilliant visionary that many of the detection methods that he used in his books were later adopted by detectives in both UK and USA and consequently the world at large. For example, Detective Holmes was guick to realize the importance of fingerprints first in The Sign of the Four (1890) which was later adopted by Scotland Yard (London's Metropolitan police service), one of the oldest police forces in the world 10 years later. Another such example is when the author used the analysis of typewritten documents in the book A Case of Identity (1891) and later on, the FBI opened its very own document analysis

section in 1932. There are countless other investigative methods that were pioneered by Sir Conan Doyle in forensic science. The author was knighted in 1902 for his work with a field hospital in Bloemfontein, South Africa, and other services during the South African (Boer) War. He was also one of the first prominent advocates of compulsory vaccination and wrote several articles voicing his support of the practice and denouncing the anti-vaxxers. The novelist also dabbled in ophthalmology and toxicology but despite his many many contributions to forensic science and other arenas, he was famous and loved by the general public including us because of his wonderful stories of the enigmatic and eccentric Sherlock Holmes. Moreover, antimicrobial drugs are very specific in the kind of microbes they combat; For instance, antibiotics do not work on viruses, hence it is not only useless against the common cold or flu, but also disrupt the body's balance of natural flora or microbiota, which is an integral part of our immune defense system and have vital roles in competing with harmful microbes, essentially preventing them from taking over.

Another profoundly important factor that is often overlooked in all countries, especially South-Asian countries like Bangladesh, is the correct and safe disposal of antibiotics. We often dump or flush away open antimicrobial drugs and it comes into direct contact with soil

or water, and hence the microorganisms residing in them. This greatly accelerates the emergence of resistant strains through rapid mutations and transfer of genes with microorganisms like bacteria, resulting in increased morbidity and mortality as well as an increased economic burden to the health care system. Implementation of return-policies in Pharmacies is more important than ever with the ongoing pandemic and the resulting increased use of antibiotics, so that left over, unused and expired antibiotics can be dropped off on-spot or mailed to them. And pharmaceutical companies must be held responsible for the appropriate destruction or recycling of these antimicrobial medicines.

We must all understand the scale at which our actions affect the public health, especially those of our loved ones. With resources being at the edge of their limits, and a pandemic straining the healthcare system, it is now more important than ever to become self-aware and promote safe and responsible use of Antimicrobials, besides doing our best to stay well and maintain personal hygiene, keep our environment clean and sanitize our belongings. Prevention is certainly better than cure, and our only hope in reducing the curve. The initiatives we take can save several lives including our own.

# Light Following Robots: IUB Students are into Robotics!

We wanted to design a robot which would be very affordable and robust for all parts of the world with minimal points of failure. So we built an autonomous light sensing robot without any digital circuits.

Using Op-Amps (Operational Amplifiers), which is an IC (integrated circuit), and two light detection sensors which are prepared with LDRs (light dependent resistors) we were able to create a robot capable of following the light source and changing directions according to the difference in light intensities.

Our project can be useful in a range of unmanned applications where human intervention may prove difficult, unproductive and/or unsafe, like in indus tries/factories where it is more cost efficient to transport materials from one room to another through predetermined "light tracks", for search and rescue missions in collapsed buildings where a survivor may be able to use their phone's torch to guide the robot to them to provide vital first aid before extraction can be viable, etc.

However, it comes with its challenges and limitations. Due to the nature of light dependent resistors, it is susceptible to external light pollution. But the desired and undesired inputs can be differentiated by modifying the LDR design to more practical Photodiodes which would be tuned for specific frequencies of the Electromagnetic spectrum.


