Originally born in the 1980s, the new versions fuse modernist design characteristics, such as a tubular metal frame and plain upholstery, with contemporary and colourful squiggly armrests. Fans of accent colours need look no further than Spanish designer Marc Morro's 'Taburete 8' bar stool for Hay for inspiration. Available in two heights and with different coloured steel-tube legs, it is a robust design with an industrial yet minimalistic expression. The red version (right) is available with the oak-veneer seat in a variety of finishes to match any interior palette. From £129 (hay.dk).



Dinosaur Designs' 'Watercolour' range is informed by the fluidity in form and tone of the painting medium, with the collection celebrating the Australian studio's unique resin-casting techniques. London-based designer Matteo Fogales' 'Tee' side table, originally designed in 2023 in wood, has been given a cork refresh in collaboration with young furniture brand Nine. Flat-packed for ease, the side table has a T-shaped interlocking structure that both gives the design strength and acts as a storage shelf for books or magazines. £229 (nine-furniture.com).


Handmade to order in Stoke-on-Trent, 'Mirror 002' by Archive for Space expands the possibilities of stainless steel. 'The material has been transformed into unexpected forms, allowing it to take on a domestic spirit rarely associated with contemporary metalwork,' the studio explains. The kidney-shaped design is created exclusively with UK design gallery Béton Brut. From £2,280 (betonbrut.co.uk).



clearly haven't seen Brooklyn-based hardware brand Goux Studio's debut designs. The 'Plus Collection' includes hooks, shelves (pictured, from approx £115), mirrors and planters, all centred around extruded, plus-sign-shaped aluminium brackets (gouxstudio.com).

Thierry Lemaire's new furniture collection sits at the crossroads of rawness, sophistication and craftsmanship. The former architect turned gallerist and designer's 'Kaala' sleek, low-slung coffee table is made from steel that's been blowtorched to create an effect that is similar to the rainbows that appear on the surface of an oil spill. Asafo flags – cotton cloths appliqued with visual narratives by the Fante people of Ghana – are the inspiration behind 'Asafo', Amechi Mandi's series of five jacquard-woven blankets, including 'To Asafo Park' (pictured). These throws, from the London-based designer's second collection, bring the vibrancy of his heritage into the contemporary home. £245 (amechihome.com).

This 'Aubette Study' rug is one of two new designs by CF Editions, working with the Fondation Arp, dedicated to the work of artists Jean Arp and Sophie Taeuber. It's taken from an artwork the latter created for Strasbourg's Cafe de l'Aubette. £15,000, Tate Shop (shop.tate.org.uk).

> Craving sunshine in the depths of winter? Mind the Gap has unveiled a cushioned lounge chair upholstered with 'Amalfi', a print capturing the light and beauty of the Italian coast. In a heavy linen or cotton velvet, its vibrant colours, flowers and foliage perfectly complement the 'Dunhill' chair. £1,950 (mindtheg.com).

High-end French textile brand Lelièvre Paris is championing cityscapes with its new collection, 'Metropolis'. The range's two designs draw on a vision of the city, 'where art, craftsmanship, industry and architecture meet to create harmonious spaces'. We love the jacquard 'District' (pictured) – a graphic Bauhaus-esque pattern of intersecting lines. From £175 per m (lelievreparis.com).

New York-based design studio In Common With is expanding its universe with a series of limited-edition works produced with Claudio Bonuglia. The Italian artist spent a month in the city working with founders Felicia Hung and Nick Ozemba to customise three pieces – including their Monarch Screen (pictured) – with his hand-painted designs. Overcoming distance and a language barrier, the results express a powerful shared creativity. Approx £23,000 (incommonwith.com).

We spotted these 'Pantograph' bookends at Dundee Design Festival, where Marc Sweeney was one of 20 Scotland-based designers in its 'Bookends' exhibition. Named after the tool used by artists to resize drawings, the pair, made using aluminium offcuts and old beer kegs, are stamped with the same holes found on pantographs. £1,000 (@marc_sweeney).



Dutch designer Onno Adriaanse's 'Dawn' stool collection pays homage to the peace of early mornings. Made from oak that gradually shifts into a coloured dye of your choice, the series is an eye-catching interplay of colour and material. Link them to form a bench or dot them throughout the house, they are sure to delight. Approx £740 per piece (onnoadriaanse.nl).

If there's one tile brand we have come to rely on for innovation, it's Mutina. The Italian ceramic specialists have done it again with Rings', a tile range by Michael Anastassiades made, unexpectedly, from wood. Each oak tile has the look of the cross-section of a tree trunk and is finished with flecks of aged délabré brass, adding a little sparkle to the rustic-looking design. The 'Classic Cupboard' was Piet Hein Eek's first design in which he began exploring the potential of scrapwood. It catapulted him into the limelight in the early 1990s and today, Eek is perhaps one of the most famed Dutch creatives - synonymous with making sustainable design beautiful and covetable. For his 'Masterworks' collection he has revisited this original classic. The one-of-a-kind unit, available at design gallery Future Perfect, is made in reclaimed and recycled materials and shows Eek's enduring ability to transform scrap into treasure. Approx £5,300 (thefutureperfect.com).
