Awarded for commitment to Easy Read

In November the People First New Zealand National Committee was pleased to present the very first Make It Easy award to CCS Disability Action - Northern region.

The award has been created as a new way to thank organisations or individuals for their commitment to making their information easy for people with learning disability to read and understand.

In his speech, National Chairperson David King said "Having information you can understand means you know what you are doing and what you are talking about. Knowledge gives you more power to understand things. CCS Disability Action – Northern region has been 1 of the only disability service providers in the country to get their information put in Easy Read. We think they are a role model for other organisations to look at. Well done on your good work of leading the Easy Read charge."

The People First New Zealand Make It Easy award will be given out every year at the national AGM.

#NeverAgain #EKoreAno campaign

The New Zealand Human Rights Commission has launched a campaign to ask the Government:

- for an independent inquiry into abuse in state care this means it will not be the Government who looks into what happened
- for a public apology to those who suffered while in state care
- to recognise the harm that was caused to the victims
- · to give the victims the support they need because of what happened
- to make sure this never happens again.

People First New Zealand National Chairperson David King has signed the petition on behalf of People First. He says "(People who were abused) should get an apology from the Government for the wrongdoing. Where people have passed away they should apologise to the family. The Government needs to work on solutions to stop this abuse from happening to anyone else. We don't have the big institutions today but this can still happen to anyone with a learning disability – young or old, any gender. We need to make this stand."

away for decades. Even whole lives. Abused

some dignity is lost."

Access Alliance campaign #accessmatters

People First New Zealand National Chairperson David King and National Committee Advisor Gordon Boxall attended the 'Access for All' Campaign Launch and Forum in Auckland on 27th February 2017. There, everybody had a think about how people could support the campaign.

David and Gordon thought of 3 reasons why People First New Zealand should support the Access Alliance campaign:

- We believe we can make an important contribution to ensure the Accessibility for New Zealanders Act benefits all disabled people
- Some barriers are more hidden than others. Some are down to people's reactions and attitudes.
 We can help show you that if you take time to understand us, we can both benefit from the experience.
- 3. Everyone can benefit if people with learning disability can achieve their dreams. Like everyone else's, our dreams are about having a job, choosing where we live and having friends. This Act will help us to be active citizens in our communities.

Leadership Forum, 9-10th November 2016, Wellington

It is always an exciting time of year when the People First Leadership Forum rolls around. This time, forum participants spent two days learning all about the **United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.**

Over 30 People First members from around the country attended 5 custom-made, accessible workshops on:

- 1. Human Rights.
- 2. The Human Rights system in NZ focusing on the Code of Health and Disability Rights.
- 3. The UN Disability Convention.
- 4. The 8 General Principles of the UN Disability Convention.
- 5. How to use the UN Disability Convention in your life.

The workshops were based on Te Pou's Education Programme Manual: Kia Noho Rangatira Ai Tātou; Human Rights and The United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

The pace and content of the workshops seemed to hit the right mark, with participants commenting:

"I learnt more about the UN Convention and the Code of Rights - there is a lot more rights that I was ever told about".

"I have been to other conferences but the material was hard to understand. This forum was good because information was in Easy Read and the presentations weren't too complicated".

The whakataukī for this year's Leadership Forum was:

Ma whero ma pango ka oti ai te mahi: with red and black the work will be complete.

This means when we all work together and everyone does their part, the work will get done. The colours talk about the traditional kowhaiwhai patterns on the inside of meeting houses.

Members put 9 panels of an artwork together over the 2 day forum, until the piece was complete. The pattern in the artwork is called Mangopare from Aotearoa and it represents the Hammerhead shark and ideas of strength, determination and fighting spirit.

Over the last 7 years it has been run, the People First Leadership Programme has had the biggest impact on leadership development for the organisation. It is often the starting point of people's journey to learning about human rights and speaking up. As the forum moves through the 2 days, members who are usually quiet and shy gain confidence to get up and include themselves in the feedback using the microphone.

People First needs strong leaders in the regions and local groups to keep the organisation strong and achieve our National Strategic goals, but the most important outcome from the Leadership Programme is for people to become leaders in their own lives. People First New Zealand aims to assist people to build the skills, knowledge and confidence to determine their own lives. The Leadership Forum Programme gives us the ability to start this process.

VALID – Having a Say Conference 8-10th February 2017, Geelong, Australia

VALID is a not for profit organisation managed by a committee of disabled people and family members. Each year VALID hosts the Having a Say Conference. It is the largest conference for disabled people in Australia. There were about 1,000 people at the 2017 conference.

People First New Zealand National Committee member Craig Bellis travelled to Geelong this year, with Life member Robert Martin and National Funding Manager Janet Doughty. Robert gave the key note speech of the conference and spoke about his involvement in writing the Disability Convention and his new role as an Independent Expert on the United Nations Committee for the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities.

The conference is quite unique, in that it is designed to be accessible for people with learning disability. Quite a change for Craig, who is used to attending conferences in New Zealand and said "it was pretty good and it had a good atmosphere. You didn't see any doctors or lawyers".

People First New Zealand ran a workshop called "The UN Disability Convention: the biggest hammer in your speaking up toolkit". It was very well attended with 35 people taking part.

Craig's thoughts about the workshop were, "I think it went really, really well. Everyone was participating, asking good questions and people were getting the answers right".

Robert said of the workshop, "It was really professional. We made a good team, the three of us".

The hardest thing for Craig, Robert and Janet to hear at the conference was the fact that there are still people with learning disability living in institutions in Australia. Even though we still have a long way to go for people with learning disability to achieve full human rights, we can be proud of the steps we have made in New Zealand, with our last large institution closing down 11 years ago.

2016 Leona Gitmans award for self-advocacy

People First New Zealand would like to congratulate Carolyn Thomas of Rotorua on being awarded the 2016 Leona Gitmans Award for Self-Advocacy.

Carolyn is a loyal, committed and passionate People First member. At her local group she takes an interest in all the members. She buys small Christmas presents for everyone and organises a mid-winter Christmas for every June meeting. She is a great baker and always comes to meetings with cupcakes to share. Amazingly, she makes a butterfly cake for each anniversary of the People First Rotorua group and regional meetings. She ices the cake herself in the traditional People First colours of purple and green.

Carolyn has been involved in many projects, including:

- · a Midland regional leadership project
- speaking to service providers about how self-advocacy impacts her life
- providing training for new employees of a local service provider what it is like to receive services and support that is below standard
- changing Taxi drivers' attitudes towards disabled people.

This award is named after Leona Gitmans, a woman who was very passionate about self-advocacy. People First NZ has a trust called **The Leona Gitmans Te Aranga Trust** and every year the People First National Committee chooses a member to receive the award. People First New Zealand has many great supporters and The Gitmans Family have been supporting People First for over 10 years. As well as a pounamu, certificate and \$500, Carolyn was also presented with a mattress topper from SlumberTop – the business of The Gitmans family.

Services to the New Zealand disability community

Rosemary Scully says she does not know who nominated her for a Queen's Service Medal but she is delighted to have received one.

The medal is the latest accolade for the intellectual disabilities researcher and advocate.

Ms Scully, who has an intellectual disability, is a life member of People First, a self-advocacy organisation run by and for people with intellectual disabilities.

She had also been involved with IHC at both local and national levels.

Advocating for the rights of people with disabilities was something she saw as a privilege, she said.

"I just like helping people. I don't do it for the glory, or the money, I just do it to help people because I like to."

She was particularly proud of her involvement in the establishment of a women's group for women with disabilities.

She had also addressed the needs of disabled women as co-researcher on the project "Identifying and addressing general life concerns of women with intellectual disabilities" conducted by the Donald Beasley Institute.

Equally important to promoting the rights of women was ensuring people had equal rights to work, she said.

She had sat on the Workbridge Council for many years to ensure more people knew about their rights, she said.

While the New Zealand disability community was stronger now, it still faced challenges. She hoped her medal would inspire others from the community to take on leadership roles.

"I hope it encourages all people with disabilities to follow their dreams and realise there is no such word as can't."

Making new connections with Rural **Women NZ**

On 16th February, Midland region members Rainus Baker QSM and Carolyn Thomas presented alongside Rural Women NZ to raise awareness of the achievements of people with learning disability in the region. In rural areas, people with learning disability have less opportunities to be recognised in their communities.

Members in the Midland region identified that they want to make their voices louder, and so approached Rural Women NZ – an organisation that has as its focus for the year the 3 C's: Communication, Connection and Collaboration, leading to a 4th C which is Community.

It was a lot of hard work to pull the event together, but connections such as these are so important to making sure people with learning disability are seen and valued in local communities. Rainus said "I enjoyed co-facilitating the workshop in another town, speaking to a group of people I don't know and supporting regional work. I would like to do more work to help communities understand us more."

Carolyn said "I was a bit nervous at the start, but by the end, I felt my voice getting louder. I think we need to go out more and tell people about us."
