 make sure that people with learning disability can speak out and be heard on things that are important to them in services, in communities and in government.





National Chairperson's report - Penelope Banfield



This has been another busy and challenging year for People First New Zealand.

I have enjoyed my role as National Chairperson. I have been to lots of meetings throughout the year. To keep doing my role during COVID-19, I have learnt to use Microsoft Teams and have been part of many online meetings.

One of the major highlights from the last year was the National Leadership Forum we held in Wellington in April. This year's forum was also a celebration - as it was the first face to face meeting we'd had at a national level in 12 months.

At the forum, members learnt more about their rights under the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, and about being a leader.

It is always great to get together at our forums, and to see the members grow through having these opportunities.

Another highlight was attending the New Zealand Down Syndrome Association National Achievement Awards ceremony at Government House in Wellington. It was great to hear about the amazing things that young people with Down Syndrome have achieved. It was my first time at Government House - and it's amazing! I really enjoyed the whole experience.

People First New Zealand is proud to be part of the Disabled People's Organisations (DPO) Coalition. It is great to work alongside the other DPOs and the Government through the important work of the DPO Coalition. We are all working towards making the rights under the United Nations Convention a reality.

As the National Chairperson, I have been attending the DPO Coalition workshops and meetings along with People First National Manager Cindy Johns. Every DPO takes its turn at chairing 6 meetings - and it was my turn



this year. This was another highlight for me. It was challenging at times but a good experience. It really helped to have a Meeting Assistant alongside me.

As COVID-19 has continued, it has certainly brought challenges to all of us. The People First New Zealand National Committee has had to make some hard decisions about stopping face to face meetings, courses and events to keep everyone safe. We had to keep checking those decisions throughout the year. We had to keep thinking about our members and how COVID-19 can affect them.

I am really proud of how People First as an organisation has coped with COVID-19. It was great that the staff reached out to members, and members reached out to each other, to make sure they were well supported.

The Make it Easy team worked very hard, putting lots of government information about COVID-19 into Easy Read so everyone could have access to information in a way that worked for them.

COVID-19 revealed some long-time issues for people with learning disability - such as not having cell phones or other devices, not having enough money to buy what they need and to pay for the internet, and not having good support from some disability services. People First needs to keep speaking up about these issues.

I want to thank the National Committee for working together as a team and keeping People First strong. Thank you to Kris Roguski, the Vice Chairperson, for stepping in for me when I haven't been available.

Thank you also to the Advisors to the National Committee, Brigit Mirfin-Veitch and Gordon Boxall, for sharing your time and advice.

And a big thank you to all the People First staff, volunteers and contractors throughout New Zealand for your hard work and assistance.

This will be my last report as National Chairperson, as I have now finished my term on the National Committee. I would like to welcome the new members to the committee, and I wish the new National Chairperson and committee all the best in leading People First.

- All our friends and whānau who have supported us.




Midland Region


While we know we can meet online, these events were a reminder of how important these face to face sessions are for personal wellbeing and good governance.

National Manager's Report

Cindy Johns

As National Manager, it has been a privilege serving People First New Zealand members over the past year, and working with a dedicated team of staff, members and volunteers.

Once again, COVID-19 has caused a lot of disruptions. There were times when we were unable to hold meetings, forums and deliver courses - and we have had to learn to roll with it. National Committee had to keep reviewing their decisions and put everyone's health and safety first.

However, I am pleased to report that there have still been many highlights for People First.

Highlights have been:

- Providing all the National Committee members with their own laptops so that we can hold meetings online. We even managed to go green - meaning we stopped printing all the National Committee papers and instead looked at them on our laptops.
- Holding the National Leadership Forum (on the third attempt to do so!) which saw members celebrating being together, developing confidence,
 skills and knowledge, and having opportunities to speak up.
- Presenting the Leona Gitmans Te Aranga Self-Advocacy award to David King from Dunedin, and the Make It Easy Award to Anne Hawker and her team at the Ministry of Social Development.
- Attending Sir Robert Martin's investiture service at Government House and co-hosting a morning tea to honor him with the Office for Disability Issues.
- Continuing to be part of the New Zealand Disabled People's
 Organisations (DPO) Coalition and its work with the New Zealand
 Government. The DPO checks that the Government's Disability Action
 Plan is on track and gives advice to many agencies as they work to
 improve the lives of disabled people. Also, as a member of the DPO
 Coalition, People First is a partner in the Independent Monitoring
 Mechanism (IMM). The IMM and the DPO Coalition are putting Articles

- 4.3 and 33 of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities into real action.
- The ongoing amazing support of our members by all staff during the different levels of COVID-19, and our members' support of one another.

I want to thank:

- All the members for making People First a great organisation.
 Throughout the year, there have been times when groups couldn't meet due to COVID-19, and I know members have found this very hard.
 Thank you for your patience and your courage.
- National Chairperson Penelope Banfield, National Vice Chairperson Kris Roguski, National Committee members Cheryl Wallace, Jason Donovan, Ronnie Sione and Shane McInroe for your commitment and decisionmaking.
- National Advisors Gordon Boxall and Brigit Mirfin-Veitch, for your ongoing commitment to People First and the members.

Together, we achieve a lot and make a difference.






People First New Zealand goals for 2020-2021

2. People First New Zealand has strong leaders.






- 3. People First New Zealand speaks up for the rights of people with learning disability:

Goal 1: People know about People First New Zealand

Every year, more and more people get to know about People First New Zealand.



Getting the word out

This year, People First's Facebook page continued to be very busy and active. With COVID-19 still showing up in the community, we kept posting a lot of information about COVID-19 in Easy Read. This included information on the different Alert Levels, how to protect yourself against COVID-19, the COVID-19 vaccine, masks and what to do if you cannot wear a mask.





- stories about People First members speaking up and being part of community projects
- news articles about people with disabilities and disability issues from around New Zealand and overseas
- updates about disability policy and major disability-related projects in New Zealand
- · events our members may be interested in
- Easy Read information from government agencies, councils and other organisations.

At the end of the 2020/21 financial year, our Facebook page had 2770 likes.

The People First website also has a range of information, including COVID-19 updates, Easy Read information and resources, and the latest news from the organisation. This year, the website was used **8796** times.

Disability information and advisory service

People First New Zealand has a disability information and advisory service. This means we answer questions that members and others in the community may have about disability issues. These include questions about:

- · issues people with learning disability face
- rights under the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities
- how to speak up for your rights as a person with learning disability
- services for people with learning disability throughout New Zealand.

We give out information to a lot of different people, including People First members, people with learning disability, whānau and support workers, and other interested people.

People First also has its own helpline, freephone 0800 20 60 70, which people with learning disability and their whānau can call for advice and information. This year, we received **756** phone calls to the helpline.

Conferences and expos

Every year, People First members attend disability conferences, symposiums and expos all over New Zealand. At these events, members often hold information stalls – to promote People First and show all the information we have available.







This is a great opportunity for members to meet and connect with others in the disability sector, improve networking skills and talk to other disabled people about human rights.

This year, members attended and represented People First at:

- The New Zealand Disability Support Network (NZDSN) National Symposium - held in both Auckland and Rotorua
- Enabling Good Lives' Next Steps 2020 Expo held in Christchurch
- Disability Connect's Transition Expo held in Wellington
- NZDSN's Banking Issues Forum held in Auckland
- "Connect-Ability": The Federation of Disability Information Centres' National Conference - held in Queenstown
- Volunteer Bay of Plenty's "Volfest" held in Tauranga.

People First members also get to speak at conferences on different topics that affect people with learning disability - such as self-advocacy, school and work, staying safe, and money.

In March 2021, People First assisted with the NZDSN's Banking Issues Forum (along with IHC and the Bankers Association) - about supporting people with learning disability to manage their finances. Members Ronnie Sione and Jenna Maguren did a presentation about issues People First members have had with using banking services.





Goal 2: People First has strong leaders

National Leadership Forum 2021

In April 2021, People First held a 2-day National Leadership Forum in Wellington. 27 members and 9 staff from all 6 regions attended the forum. From each region, 4 members (plus each Regional President) were chosen to attend.

The purpose of the Leadership Forum is for members to develop confidence, skills and knowledge – by participating in workshops, learning about rights, meeting new people, and practicing speaking up in a safe environment. Members take the skills they have learned and use them in positive ways – for example, when serving on national advisory groups and speaking up for change in the community.











At the forum, members took part in workshops that relate to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD). Topics included:

- human rights
- · the Health and Disability Code of Rights in New Zealand
- the 8 General Principles of the UNCRPD
- how to use the UNCRPD in your life
- the Treaty of Waitangi/Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

At the workshops, members got to work on public speaking skills, sharing thoughts and ideas with the group.

Each of the People First National Committee co-lead one of the workshops, and gave presentations to the members about their leadership experiences. Members also heard a presentation from Sir Robert Martin KNZM about his role in the development of the UNCRPD.

The forum ended with an awards dinner, where each of the members received a certificate for participating. The certificates were presented by guests Paula Tesoriero, Disability Rights Commissioner, and Brian Coffey, Director of the Office for Disability Issues.



Balclutha member **Philippa Henderson** had this to say about the forum: "My major highlight was meeting Sir Robert Martin and gaining more knowledge. I felt encouraged by others to step up and become a leader and I gained a lot of confidence. I'm not afraid to stand up and advocate for someone. I now know this is what I want to do: stand up for people with disabilities."

Leona Gitmans Te Aranga Self-Advocacy Award 2021

Leona Gitmans was passionate about people with learning disability knowing about self-advocacy. When Leona passed away, her parents asked family and friends to make donations to People First, rather than bring flowers to her funeral service.

We would like to say a big thank you to the Gitmans family who, in Leona's memory, support People First to this day.

The People First New Zealand National Committee gives an award every year, in Leona's name, to a person with learning disability who has been a strong leader in self-advocacy in their community. People First New Zealand was thrilled to present the 2021 Leona Gitmans Te Aranga Self-Advocacy Award to Dunedin member David King.

Southern Regional Coordinator Lee-ann Wightman had this to say about David:

"David is a fantastic advocate for the rights of people with learning disability. He is not afraid to speak up and is a strong voice in the local disability community in Dunedin.

"Most importantly, David continually offers huge amounts of encouragement, support and guidance to the younger People First members. He has become a mentor in his Local Group and always brings with him a great sense of humour."

At the Leadership Forum awards dinner, David was presented with a beautifully carved pounamu (greenstone), a certificate, and a cash prize. Congratulations, David!







Goal 3: People First speaks up

Advisory group work

Members from around New Zealand represent People First on many local, regional and national advisory groups and committees working for disability rights. Their role is to be a voice for people with learning disability, and make sure all policies will assist people with learning disability to lead good lives.

Thank you to all the members who have taken on these roles. This year, People First members were on **9** national advisory committees. Topics discussed by these committees included:

- employment
- housing
- transport
- justice
- banking and money
- making disability supports better.

People First New Zealand provides trained Meeting Assistants for members who represent People First on advisory committees. People First would like to thank everyone who has worked as a Meeting Assistant over the last 12 months. Your work allows people with learning disability to have an equal voice when speaking up for human rights.







Speaking up in the community

As well as contributing to groups and committees, People First members have been involved in many community advocacy projects - speaking up to make life better for people with learning disability.

Some of these projects are:

- making presentations to local councils about ways to make their home towns more accessible
- meeting District Health Board staff to talk about better health supports for people with learning disability
- meeting with police to talk about stopping violence and how to work better with disabled people
- being part of a workshop with civil defence providers on how to better assist disabled people in an emergency.

Well done to all the members, and their Local Assistants, whose feedback and ideas have assisted to make communities that are more accessible and that everyone can be part of!

Submissions, surveys and consultations

People First New Zealand makes submissions to the Government when it is thinking about making new laws. Knowing what New Zealanders think helps the Government choose what to include in these laws, and how they affect people's lives. We think it is important that the Government hears from people with disabilities.



As well as making submissions to the Government, People First also gives its feedback to major disability organisations and committees, so they can make policies and guidelines that include everyone.

This year, People First has made submissions on many different topics, including:

- preventing family violence and sexual violence against disabled people
- supporting and assisting disabled people to testify in court
- organisations making their work more accessible and including all people
- supporting disabled people to live in the community.

DPO Coalition

People First New Zealand is part of a group called the DPO Coalition. DPO stands for Disabled People's Organisations. "Coalition" means a group that works together.

The DPO Coalition meets every month, and its goal is to make the rights under the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities a reality in New Zealand. People First is represented at these meetings by National Chairperson Penelope Banfield and National Manager Cindy Johns. Every DPO representative gets to be chair – and, this year, Penelope got to chair 6 meetings.

An important project for the DPO Coalition this year was making a group of short videos called "Disabled People & COVID-19." These videos showed members from all the Disabled People's Organisations talking about issues disabled New Zealanders faced during the COVID-19 lockdown in 2020. Topics discussed included food shopping, social distancing, communication, mental health, and accessing support. People First member Jenna Maguren appeared in one of the videos.

Sir Robert Martin KNZM

People First New Zealand is extremely proud of Life Member Sir Robert Martin, who continues his role as an independent expert on the United Nations Committee on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities. In November 2020, Sir Robert was re-elected to the United Nations Committee for another 4-year term.

Sir Robert's role usually takes him to Geneva, Switzerland, twice a year, but he has not been able to travel due to COVID-19. He has been taking part in meetings with the United Nations via Zoom, assisted by People First.

The United Nations committee Sir Robert serves on looks at the countries that have signed the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities to see how well they are putting the rights within the Convention in place. This year, he has taken on the role of Co-Chairperson of the United Nations' working group on deinstitutionalisation.

In October 2020, Sir Robert got to attend his investiture ceremony (which was delayed due to COVID-19), where he was presented with his New Zealand Honours medal by Dame Patsy Reddy, Governor-General of New Zealand. The next day, People First and the Office for Disability Issues hosted a morning tea for Sir Robert to celebrate all his achievements. People First members presented him with a pounamu, and Central Region Co-Vice Presidents Hamish Taverner and James Carr made speeches in his honour.









Goal 4: People First respects and welcomes people from all cultures

Te Tiriti o Waitangi training

Te Tiriti o Waitangi (the Treaty of Waitangi) is the founding document of Aotearoa. People First New Zealand has made a commitment to honour Te Tiriti and support the rights of Māori, the tāngata whenua of Aotearoa, under Te Tiriti.

As part of its Learn With Us course on the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities,



People First teaches members about Te Tiriti, its importance to New Zealand, and how Māori rights are made real. This year, we delivered a Te Tiriti workshop at the National Leadership Forum, led by Sharon Glavish, the Local Assistant for Selwyn.

As part of this workshop, members got to write and practice their "pepeha" (a way of introducing yourself in te reo Māori), with assistance from Sharon and members from Midsouth. Members really enjoyed learning this new skill.

Promoting tikanga Māori

Te reo Māori is an official language of New Zealand – and it is important to People First to promote te reo and help keep it alive.

Since 2018, the Selwyn Local Group has led the inclusion of te reo and tikanga Māori in the Midsouth Region. The members have developed a booklet of Māori waiata and karakia to use at their Local Group meetings, and also use meetings as a chance to use and practice te reo. Learning te reo and tikanga Māori together brings whanaungatanga (connection) to People First - and helps members connect with their culture.



Goal 5: People First has an Easy Read translation service

Easy Read is a way of making information accessible for people with learning disability. Easy Read uses everyday words, large print and pictures to make complex information easier to understand. Easy Read can also help other people, such as those who have low literacy, are older, are Deaf, and use English as a second language.

People First New Zealand's Easy Read translation service is called Make it Easy. In the 2020/21 financial year, the Make it Easy team translated **137** documents.



People First is part of the Accessible Formats Working Group, which is led by the Ministry of Social Development. This group works hard to make sure government services know about the Accessibility Charter. The Accessibility Charter says that New Zealand government services need to display their information in 5 accessible formats: Easy Read, New Zealand Sign Language, Braille, large print and audio.

Putting government information about COVID-19 and the COVID-19 vaccine into Easy Read continued to keep our Make it Easy team busy. The team also translated many important documents for government departments and other organisations, including:

 a guide to voting in the 2020 Election, and information on the End of Life Choice Act and Cannabis Regulation and Control Bill



- the New Zealand Bankers Association Code of Banking Practice
- reports from the Royal Commission of Inquiry into Abuse in Care
- the Government's report on health and disability reform
- the Ombudsman's report about the removal of babies from disabled parents by Oranga Tamariki
- information for OUTLine for parents on how to support their LGBTQ+ children
- Napier City Council's Long-Term Plan and Positive Ageing Strategy
- CCS Disability Action's Disability Leadership Plan and Māori Development Plan.

The Electoral Commission gave this feedback about working with People First on its Easy Read materials on the 2020 Election:

Make It Easy Award 2021

Every year, the People First New Zealand National Committee gives out an award to an organisation or person who has made a great commitment to displaying their information in Easy Read. At the Leadership Forum in April 2021, People First gave the award to the Ministry of Social Development (MSD). MSD showed strong leadership during COVID-19: publishing COVID-19 factsheets in Easy Read and promoting accessible information to other government departments.

People First would particularly like to acknowledge Anne Hawker ONZM, Principal Disability Advisor at MSD – who has, for many years, been a strong supporter of Easy Read. Anne's colleagues at MSD, Jo Orange and Callum McMenamin, accepted the Make It Easy Award on her behalf.

Well done, MSD – thank you for making sure disabled New Zealanders had the information they needed during this difficult time in history.



Goal 6: People First has courses

Learn With Us is the education arm of People First New Zealand. Members and staff write and teach courses together.

People First knows how to teach and organise courses in a way that works for people with learning disability.

This year, COVID-19 continued to make it difficult for us deliver all the courses we had planned. However, the courses we were able to run were very well received by the members who attended.

In 2020/21, Learn With Us delivered:

5 Money Smarts Made Easy courses, which **63** people attended altogether

 ${f 3}$ Keeping Safe Feeling Safe courses, which ${f 39}$ people attended altogether

2 Work and Your Rights in New Zealand courses, which 30 people

attended altogether

1 UN Convention course, which23 people attended

1 Speaking Up course, which 15 people attended.



Here is some feedback from people who attended this year's courses:

"People might be angry, sad or worried - and I got to practice things that help. In the [role] play someone ran away with my purse, and I learnt to go to the police for help."

"My autism and anxiety world isn't as scary now that I'm learning to keep myself safe."

"We all have rights. The right to be safe. Don't be shy to speak up. Thank you."

"I learnt the knowledge and skills to speak up. I feel more confident speaking up about any problems I have."

"My favourite part [of the course] was going to the police station and trying on the police vests. We also learned about consent: yes means yes, and no means no."

Thank you to all the members and staff involved with Learn With Us this year.







Wellbeing Digital Tool Project

This year, People First received funding to develop a digital tool to help deliver Learn With Us courses online.

People First put together a Project Team, made up of 5 members and 6 staff from around the country, to design this online app. The Project Team has been meeting with Springload - a digital company from Wellington – to brainstorm ideas and come up with new concepts.

The final product will be a very visual and interactive tool, which is easy to use. It will help people with learning disability to:

- · learn about rights
- stay safe in the community
- participate in the community as equals
- · connect with one another.

People First is very excited about this project – and we're proud of all the ideas our members have spoken up about so far.





Goal 7: People First is a strong DPO

Strong Governance

The National Committee of People First New Zealand, which meets at least 3 times a year, provides strong governance and leadership.

Throughout COVID-19, National Committee members have learnt to use Zoom and Microsoft Teams, and have held more meetings to talk about how to keep People First members safe during the different COVID-19 Alert Levels.

People First staff work hard to keep the organisation strong at all levels - local, regional and national - through having good systems, policies and practices in place.

The People First Funding Manager makes applications to get funding to:

- support Local Groups
- cover costs such as rent and stationery
- run Learn With Us courses
- run regional and national projects.





During COVID-19, People First staff have continued to work very hard and have:

- reached out to members during the various Alert Levels
- ran a helpline through the free 0800 number
- worked alongside the Government to distribute information and resolve issues facing people with learning disability
- distributed Easy Read information.

Annual General Meeting 2020

To help keep our members safe, our 2020 AGM was held via Zoom – a first for our organisation! It was a great event that celebrated People First New Zealand's work and achievements from the last year. **73** people joined the meeting - including members from all over New Zealand, with support from staff and whānau.

Reports were presented to the members, including reports from the:

- Regional Presidents
- National Manager
- Funding Manager.

A report was also presented on People First's financial performance for 2019/20.





What these words and numbers mean

Current assets

These are the things that People First owns, which change over time - such as the amount of money we have in the bank.

At the end of this year, the money amount of these things is 1 million, 5 hundred and 76 thousand, 2 hundred and 12 dollars.

Fixed assets

These are the things that People First owns, which do not change – such as computers and office furniture.

At the end of this year, the money amount of these things is 20 thousand, 9 hundred and 71 dollars.

Total assets

These are things that People First owns, such as money in the bank, computers and office furniture.

If we add our current assets and fixed assets together, this gives us our total assets.

At the end of this year, the money amount of these things is 1 million, 5 hundred and 97 thousand, 1 hundred and 83 dollars.

Current Liabilities

These are the things that People First owes to other people or organisations.

At the end of this year, the money amount of these things is 6 hundred and 96 thousand, 1 hundred and 76 dollars.

Net assets

This is how much money People First can say it has, after taking away the money it owes.

At the end of this year, the money amount People First has is 9 hundred and 1 thousand, 7 dollars.
