Study Guide:

"Old Self: Portrait of the Artist as He Will (Not) Be, Variation 1" (2011) by Evan Penny

About the artwork: Old Self: Portrait of the Artist as He Will (Not) Be, Variation 1 is a twice-life-size, sculptural bust depicting the head and shoulders of a man in his mid-70s. This man wears a plain t-shirt, round glasses, and a contemplative facial expression. Up close, it is highly detailed with stubble, wrinkled skin marked by



blemishes and stippled with tiny pores. The work is both a self-portrait of the artist and an imaginary portrayal of the artist as he may look one day, years in the future. Penny says the portrait evokes experience and world-weariness. *Old Self* belongs to a two-part series of sculptures, with its companion piece *Young Self: Portrait of the Artist as He Was (Not)*. The pair is often exhibited together, each accompanied by a black-and-white photographic portrait of the sculpture hung nearby. *Old Self* and *Young Self* both started with a 3D photographic scan of the artist's own body. With the use of a computer numerical control (CNC) machine and traditional clay and silicone modeling, Penny spent over 200 hours in the creative process. Although *Old Self* is a complete fiction, Penny has said the work has changed his self-image. He feels older now, having imagined it so intensely. The black-and-white photograph that accompanies the sculpture closes the loop, so to speak. The picture shows a living, breathing person. It appears like proof that this man, who's purely an invention of the artist's imagination, exists in our world. Penny's work suggests, by the same token, that photographs may not be the reliable documents of reality we mistake them for.

**About the artist:** Evan Penny is a Canadian artist world-renowned for his spectacularly realistic creations that manipulate the human body in surprising ways. Penny was born in South Africa in 1953. His father was a missionary doctor and the Penny family moved frequently, eventually immigrating to the Northwest Territories, Canada, in 1964. Penny attended the Alberta College of Art (now the Alberta University of the Arts), studying sculpture. He began making and exhibiting realistic sculptures of the human form in the late 70s and early 80s. He has also worked extensively in special effects for the film and

television industry. He created notable prostheses, body doubles and props for films like *Jacob's Ladder*, *Legends of the Fall*, *Nixon*, *JFK*, *X-Men* and David Cronenberg's *eXistenZ* and was even nominated for an Emmy (*Truman* 1995). Through his experience with special effects, Penny became skilled in using materials like human hair and fleshy silicone, and he began incorporating these techniques in his sculptures. Penny is associated with an art movement known as hyperrealism, an advancement of photorealism; it draws on our familiarity with high-resolution pictures, digital manipulation, and computer-generated imagery, creating lifelike works that expand beyond the world we observe. Photorealism asks, "What happens when you take a distortion of the human body that is normal in the context of an image and bring it into our physical space?"

Please preview the short film and then share it with your students. Select one or two guiding questions that reflect your curriculum and can guide student research and inquiry connected to the artwork, artists, and the socio-cultural context in which it was created.

# **Guiding Questions:**

- In a world of AI and social media, how do we know what we see is real?
- Examine the way the artist uses the principle of "duration" in this artwork.
- Examine the way the artist uses the principle of "point of view" in this artwork.
- In what ways does this artwork ask us to guestion what is real?
- What effects might the widespread use of computers and associated technologies have on society and how we perceive ourselves?
- Examine how ideas of aging are present in the artist's work.
- How does Penny's work in film support his success as a sculpture?
- Explore possible career paths in art and film, what training and skills might be required?
- Examine how the process and the variety of material contributes to the success of the artwork.
- Create an artwork, dance, dramatic scene, or creative writing piece that compares and contrasts your current self with your future self.
- Create an artwork, dance, dramatic scene, or creative writing piece that compares and contrasts your current self with your future self.
- What factors might contribute to healthful aging?
- Examine environmental issues related to health care, personal well-being, and experiences of aging.
- Create an artwork, dance, dramatic scene, or creative writing piece that explores the impact of conventions and/or unconventional healthcare.
