QUESTION 1 Below are two graphs of polynomial functions.

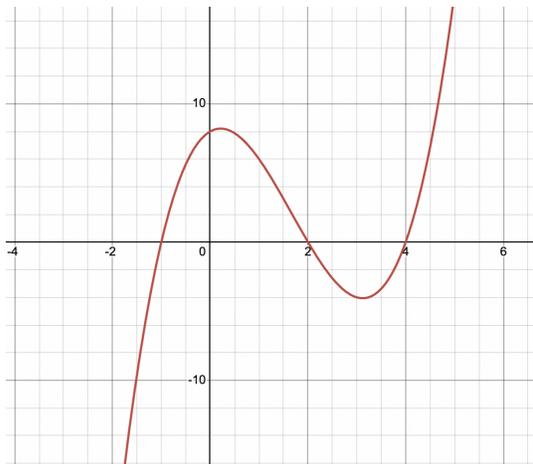
- Compare some of the key features of both graphs (including but not limited to their x-intercepts, end behavior, and general shape).
- Here are two polynomial functions, f and g , that correspond to the provided graphs. Identify which function corresponds to which graph and explain your reasoning.

$$f(x) = (x - 2)(x + 1)(x - 4)$$

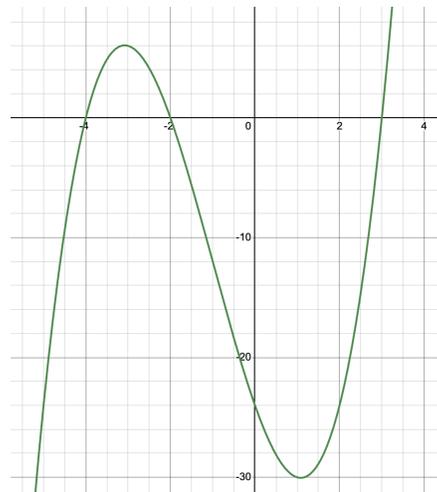
$$g(x) = x^3 + 3x^2 - 10x - 24$$

QUESTION 2 The function $h(x)$ represents another polynomial function. Its graph indicates that it has the following features:

- A degree of 4
- Zeros at $x = -3$, $x = 1$, $x = 4$
- A negative leading coefficient
- A y-intercept of 12

Which of the following equations could represent $h(x)$? Explain your reasoning.



A. $h(x) = -(x + 3)(x - 1)(x - 4)(x + 2)$

B. $h(x) = -(x + 3)(x - 1)^2(x - 4)$

C. $h(x) = (x + 3)(x - 1)^2(x - 4)$

D. $h(x) = -2(x + 3)(x - 1)(x - 4)$

QUESTION 3 Amber drew a graph of a polynomial that has exactly five zeros. Using this information, answer the following questions:

- Amber is exploring ways to write a 5th degree polynomial using those five zeros. Write a 5th degree polynomial equation that has exactly five zeros.
- Amber is exploring other ways to write a polynomial using those five zeros, this time she wants to have a degree that is not 5. Is this possible? If so, provide an example.



QUESTION 4 Two competing businesses, Business K and Business J, tracked their yearly profits (in thousands of dollars) and found that the following models best fit their profits over the last year:

$$k(x) = x^3 + 5x^2 - 14x$$
$$j(x) = x^3 + 2x^2 - 3x - 36$$

- A. What do you **notice and wonder** about the two models? What information in the text above supports what you notice?
- B. How might you use these functions to compare the profits between Business K and Business J?
- C. Find the difference between k and j .
- D. The resulting polynomial is always positive; justify why this is. What does this tell you about the profits of Business K compared to Business J over the last year?



QUESTION 5 What else did you learn that was not reflected in Questions 1-4?



QUESTION 6 Compare your answers to these questions now to your answers from the earlier attempt. What do you notice about your progress?
