

Case Study

Type: Sharing Ideas, Practicing



What Is It?

A true story about a real situation or person that participants read and analyze individually or in groups.

Why Use It?

Helps participants reflect on lessons that can be learned from others' experiences

Provides an opportunity for participants to apply their new knowledge to analyze a situation

How to Use It

1. Prepare a written description of the case study (or case studies) you want the participants to analyze.
2. Ask the participants to read the case study. If there are several case studies, divide participants into groups and ask each group to read a different case study.
3. Provide the participants with a series of questions (verbal or written) about the case study to discuss. The questions you ask should fit the learning outcomes for the lesson.
4. Ask the participants to answer the questions (individually, in small groups or in the large group).

Trainer Notes

Make sure you have permission from the person or organization this case study is about.

If the participants are not literate, read the case study aloud for them or consider presenting a video or story with images instead of only writing.
