# <u>Research Policy Brief</u> American Indian/Alaska Native Juvenile Justice Data Resources

The National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) Policy Research Center developed resources over the past few years on American Indian and Alaska Native (AI/AN) juvenile justice data, and this Research Policy Brief serves as a quick reference for these resources.

## **Research Policy Updates**

The NCAI Policy Research Center developed Research Policy Updates on AI/AN juvenile justice data, and these resources are listed below:

- American Indian and Alaska Native Youth in the Juvenile Justice System: A Guide to the Data (2020). This research policy update describes the methodology and findings of the 2018 GAO report Native American Youth: Involvement in Justice Systems and Information on Grants to Help Address Juvenile Delinquency, identifies potential research questions and provides a data guide to sources of AI/AN juvenile justice data.
- American Indian and Alaska Native Youth in the Juvenile Justice System Policies and Practices (2021). This research report provides an update on a landscape analysis of state policies on arrest and confinement of Al/AN youth to determine if there were differences in states with over-, equal-, and under-representation of Al/AN youth in the justice system.

## Guide to Juvenile Justice Data

The NCAI Policy Research Center also hosts a webpage that serves as a guide to primary sources of data on juvenile justice:

The website includes a description of the challenges with compiling and comparing data on AI/AN youth in justice systems, and links to the following primary data resources:

### **Detention Statistics:**

- The <u>Census of Juveniles in Residential Placement</u> and <u>Juvenile Residential Facility Census</u>
  are surveys that occur on alternating years to measure information on juveniles in detention
  facilities.
- The <u>Census of Tribal Justice Agencies in American Indian and Alaska Native Tribal Jurisdictions</u> collects data on law enforcement agencies operating on tribal lands.
- The Federal Bureau of Prisons collects data on inmate populations.
- <u>Jails in Indian Country</u> is a data collection by the US Bureau of Justice Statistics on confinement facilities operated by Tribal Nations or the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

### Crime and Victim Statistics:

- <u>The Easy Access Datasets</u> are easy to use datasets created by different federal agencies. Downloadable spreadsheets, overviews, snapshots, and publications are available for juvenile justice population, arrests, court cases, and residential placements.
- The <u>Federal Bureau of Investigation Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) System</u> collects data from federal, state/local, and tribal law enforcement agencies. This online data tool provides information on crime statistics taken during arrest or crime report.
- <u>The National Juvenile Court Data Archive</u> collects data on juvenile court statistics, courtgenerated research data, and multi-record administrative data from juvenile case files. Datasets can be made available by contacting the National Juvenile Court Data Archive.
- The Statistical Briefing Book provides a range of data on juvenile arrest, court, probation, and re-entry rates. Datasets can identify AI/AN specific information and include state or county comparisons. Additional data publications, snapshots, and interactive maps on juveniles can be searched by year and by step in the justice process.
