





Key facts

- Established in 2014, listed in 2017
- Norwegian banking license (EU passporting)
- Fully centralised operations (<80 FTEs)
- Consumer loans and cards in Norway, Sweden and Finland. Partner based distribution
- Deposits funded in Norway, Sweden and Germany
- Re-branded to Morrow Bank in May 2023

Q3 2023 highlights: solid performance with strong cost and credit risk control



Controlled loan growth



- Underlying loan balance growth of 5% vs. Q2 2023 (4%) amid prudent risk management
- 34% growth y-o-y supported by better customer processes and automation (throughput)

Stable margins



- Net interest margin stable at 9%, in line with the four previous quarters
- 2%p increase in borrowing cost y-o-y compensated by growth and loan repricing

Continued cost reductions



- Operating expenses reduced to MNOK 77, down 7% vs Q2
- 19% cost reduction y-o-y driven by initiatives to improve cost efficiency: C/I at 29% in Q3

Solid credit risk control



- Loan loss ratio at 5%, up 0.2%p in Q3 driven by macro and other provisions
- Enhanced credit risk and pricing analytics enabling growth and control





Third quarter Financial review



Steady loan growth



Underlying loan growth of 5% in Q3 (vs. 4% in Q2) in local currencies and excluding NPL sales.

Finland

- Continued strong sales performance
- Underlying loan Q3 development: MNOK 578 (+13.6%)
- Focus on profitable growth and capturing market share

Norway

- Slightly decreasing balances
- Underlying loan Q3 development: MNOK -47 (-1.5%)
- Focus on maintaining margin

Sweden

- Positive development continuing
- Underlying Q3 loan development: MNOK 39 (+1.5%)
- Focus on continued controlled growth








Successful loan repricing protecting margins



Yield, performing loans and deposits





Repricing of loan book to protect net yield

- Deposit rates trending upwards reflecting market development
- Multiple rate increases on loans to maintain margins
 - Some time lag in repricing loan book due to notification requirements in Norway and Finland

Outlook

- Continuing to repricing loan book to reflect higher market interest rates
- Lower market rates to drive margins up in the medium term

Stable total income




Q3 total income of MNOK 264

- Increase in interest income of MNOK ~15 vs. Q2, however outweighed by slightly higher interest expenses
- MNOK ~7 in gain on investments in financial instruments in Q3 vs. MNOK 6 in Q2 2023
- Adjusted for MNOK 5 in positive one-offs in Q2, total income was stable in Q3

Delivering on target cost efficiency level




Opex reduced: cost/income ratio at 29% in Q3

- Total operating expenses before depreciation and writeoffs reduced to MNOK 76.7 (MNOK 82.7)
- Result of strategic initiatives to improve cost efficiency
- Cost base reduced by >20% since Q1 2022

Outlook

- Targeting cost/income ratio of <30% in Q4 2023 and beyond
- IT cost of ownership expected to further decrease
- Focusing on continuous optimization to drive further efficiencies

Strong credit risk control




Increased provisions impacting loan loss ratio

- Loan loss ratio increased to 5.0% compared to 4.8% in Q2
- Increase mainly driven by higher model-based provisions, and a result of high growth levels last 12-18 months
- Tightened credit policies and strengthened collection processes in the quarter
- Continue to closely monitor credit risk development and adjust models accordingly


Loan loss ratio expected to normalise around 4.5% over time


Loan loss break-down Q3 (MNOK)

Q3 profit of MNOK 36

- Total income stable when adjusting for one-off in Q2
- Further cost improvements
- Somewhat increased loan loss provisions
- ROE of 6.1% in quarter (ROTE of 6.9%)



Capital levels provide headroom and support growth




Regulatory capital structure (%) Q-o-Q

- Current capital position supports the Bank's growth plans







Earnings per share (NOK)








