Contaminated Site

- Defined as soil and/or water (surface or ground water) which has been polluted and compromised environmentally which may cause harm to humans and/or animals through exposure.
- Most often, on reserve contaminated sites are contaminated with petroleum hydro carbons (PHCs) products, dissolved metals, liquid sewage and sometime waste leachate.

Spill Reporting - Due Diligence

When a spill happens today or tomorrow

- Discharge to the natural environment
- Potential to cause damage to property or harm to human, animals or vegetation
- Loss of useable land

SPILLS MUST BE REPORTED

Be prepared to provide details Take steps and precautions.

- 1. Assess the spill (risk)
- 2. Stop the spill;
- 3. Notify Spills Action Centre
- 4. Contain and recover
- 5. Collect and dispose of Contaminant Sorbents
- 6. Make repairs

Historical Federal Liabilities

Mid 90's - Pre training

Ell Sites Assessments

- Series of site by site assessments completed to identify the magnitude of contaminated sites on FN reserves.
- Some remedial efforts were completed at high priority sites between 1997–2005.

(FCSAP Round 1)

Post 1998

Polluter Pays Policy

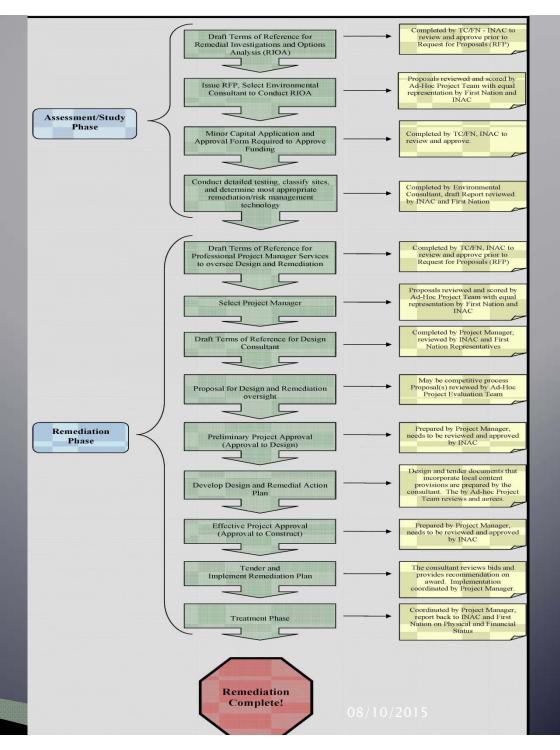
- After late 90s when INAC delivered initial fuel handling and spill training regionally.
- In 1997-98 INAC determined that all spills or releases post EII assessments, would be the responsibility of the polluter.

Process

AANDC developed a flow chart to help understand the process...!?

Phases

- Assessment/Study
- 2. Design (monitoring)
- 3. Remediation, and
- 4. Closure/Completion



FCSAP

Federal Contaminated Sites Action Plan

A highly technical process and system put in place by Federal Government to classify and prioritize <u>all</u> (not just FN reserve) Federal contaminated sites for remedial efforts.

AANDC, through FCSAP, will remediate Class 1 and sometimes Class 2 sites.

Class 1 sites are those which score a 70 or higher on the ranking system.

Project Approval Process Remedial Investigation Options Analysis (RIOA

- Prepare Terms of Reference (TOR)
- Issue Request For Proposals (RFP) to complete assessment/study work
- Prepare Minor Capital Application (MCA) for funding approvals
- Conduct Assessment work

Design Phase - Steps

Once site assessments have been completed Funding needs to be secured for Design Phase

- TOR, RFP and selection of Professional Project Management services (PPM)
- 2. TOR, RFP for Design Consultant
- 3. Evaluate and Review Design Proposal
- 4. Preliminary Project Approval (PPA), now Design Approval Request (DAR)
- Develop Design and Remedial Action Plan (RAP)

Sampling and Monitoring Events

Often in this process when phases are delayed for several years, AANDC requires <u>additional</u> <u>sampling and monitoring events.</u>

to confirm data and assist consultants in determining next steps and costing models for design and or remediation.

Many projects a have been known to have more than 5 year delays between assessment and design and design and remediation.

Contract Tendering

Once Design and Tender specifications are completed;

- and no further sampling or monitoring is required,
- using data and cost estimates from the completed Design,
- Project Approval Request (PAR) is prepared and submitted for funding approval.
- Project is tendered, by public or invitational bid process, sometimes in phases.

Remediation and Treatment

Remediation of the contaminates can be designed and carryout in a number of ways;

- Ex-Situ
- In-Situ
- Combination
- Other technologies



Contaminated soils are either relocated and treated in a contained facility, or left in place and treated in ground with the use of additives.

Plenty of opportunity for local involvement and jobs at this stage.



BIOCELL Treatment Facility >>>

Water flows to end of cell where it treated and eventually discharged

Completion/Closure

When the soil and/or water is determined clean and free of contaminates.

- Sampling is ongoing during treatment and reports are normally prepared annually.
- Once soil conditions meet parameters, soil is most often transferred and used as landfill cover,

- Or maybe fill for roads or non residential areas.
- Treatment can take anywhere from 2 to 8 seasons, pending regular operation and maintenance.
