


Fighting cancer to give

Your local hospital charity wants to do all it can to help those going through one of the hardest challenges of their lives. Our Cancer Appeal has helped thousands of patients over the years and continues to support those dealing with cancer, especially as we now live in the stark reality that one in two people will develop this terrible disease during their lifetime.



With our multimillion-pound Cancer Appeal we will be able to provide state-of-the-art treatment machines in Birmingham, giving hope to thousands of cancer patients in the city and across the West Midlands. Having to deal with a cancer diagnosis can really take its toll mentally and physically, but with your support, we can continue to fund items from Cancer Cloud Kits to explain to younger family members what their loved one is going through to free accommodation for families so they can stay close to their loved ones who have travelled great distances for complicated treatment.



Sadly, children aren't immune to this dreadful disease, which is why, as a hospital charity, we do all we can to offer our young cancer patients the home comforts that can help take away some of their fears and sadness during treatment.

Whether they are patients at Heartlands, Good Hope, Solihull or Birmingham Children's Hospital, all come to the QE's Radiotherapy Department to benefit from the cutting-edge radiotherapy equipment funded by the Charity. We also fund personalised blankets that keep patients warm during their radiotherapy sessions and specially designed masks, that can be painted to look like their superheroes, boosting their confidence and prevent them from needing an anaesthetic. Once they have completed their treatment, we also fund a special toy to celebrate what brave little ones they are.

As well as funding vital work such as groundbreaking research and immunology trials we also fund a teacher, so our young patients don't fall behind on their studies. And to help lighten things up while on the Young Person's Unit, we fund cooked breakfasts on a Friday and pizza nights to encourage a sense of normality in what can be a turbulent time for our patients.



Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham is a centre of excellence for cancer care in the West Midlands. As such, we are raising funds for a new pioneering machine, a PET-CT Scanner. This will transform the care we are able to provide the thousands of patients treated at the QE by helping to investigate cancer cases and create more efficient care plans. determining both the spread of cancer and how well it has responded to treatment. This will allow doctors to diagnose patients quicker, giving them access to life-saving treatment sooner. The new scanner can also mean that approximately 2,500 more patients could be seen each year, cutting waiting times and help reduce anxiety levels.

MEET OUR FABULOUS FUNDRAISER, DAVID

David Waide took on a 132-mile trek around the coast of Anglesey in July and raised almost £3,500 to go towards funding the PET-CT Scanner.

Last October David had an accident and hit his head, knocking him unconscious. He went to A&E and had a scan that didn't show any broken bones but did identify a suspicious lesion on his right lung. This turned out to be lung cancer. David had no symptoms, so he was extremely fortunate the tumour was discovered.

David received excellent care from the team at Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham, and following a successful lobectomy using robotic surgery, the cancer was removed, and he has made an amazing recovery. David's donations will go towards the new scanner to thank the QE team who cared for him and help other cancer patients.

"Hi, I'm Victoria. I was diagnosed with Acute Myeloid Leukaemia in March 2023 and admitted to the QE,

where I spent several weeks including 5 admissions onto the Young Persons Unit and had many visits to the Haematology Day Centre for treatment. It was tough and gruelling, but many people supported me through my hospital journey, in particular the services who receive funding from QEHB Charity.

During my first admission Jayne, the specialist teacher on the ward, helped me sort my leave of absence from university and change to student finance as well as all the other things that came with a sudden absence from my course due to my cancer treatment. I felt reassured that everything was taken care of, and

she involved me in the whole process. Jayne has continued to support me leading up to my return to university and my application for Disabled Student Allowance.

Whilst in hospital I enjoyed a weekly cooked breakfast and treats like Easter eggs and Iollies all funded by the Charity which provided happier moments. I also had access to a variety of games, books and films on the ward to keep me occupied and distracted from treatment. Since being in remission, I have had the opportunity to attend the education awards night earlier this year with other young people in similar situations.

Thousands of cancer patients have faced a similar battle to me and thousands more will face one. Please join me in supporting the Cancer Appeal so the Charity can help more cancer patients in the future."

Supporting our transp life-changin

"I prepared myself for whatever fate had in store...and then the miracle happened."

Andy had been living with a chronic lung disease (Idiopathic Pulmonary Fibrosis (IPF)), until he received a life-changing double lung transplant at Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham in 2018.

Aged 42, Andy first started noticing problems with his breathing in 2006. He went to his GP who said it was nothing to be concerned about, as he was still physically active at the time, playing badminton, squash, golf and football. A year later he developed a horrible cough and began to lose his voice. That was the beginning of his journey to find answers.

Over the next 6 years, Andy went through various tests, biopsies and CT scans. In 2006, his lung function was 60% of what a "normal" person should have at his age and by 2012 it was down to 45%. Andy was told he would need a lung transplant within 2-3 years.

By August 2018 Andy was barely holding on, planning each day carefully and using supplemental oxygen. His lung function was so low by this point that if it should drop any lower the machines would not be able to register it. Andy said, "I prepared myself for whatever fate had in store. I was still trying to live a 'normal life', to provide for my family and took joy in watching them smile or laugh, savouring those moments."

Andy's quality of life was getting progressively worse, until, in his words, "the miracle happened." On September 18, Andy received the call telling him suitable lungs



had been found and within half an hour he was at the hospital. There were some issues concerning his heart and kidneys, but after six weeks in hospital, Andy was allowed home.

Since his transplant, Andy has been living life to the full, enjoying every day and making future plans with his loved ones. He has seen more grandchildren join his family and this year attended his surprise 60th birthday party, a day he didn't think he'd live to see.

Andy says he received wonderful care from the team at Queen

Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham and is extremely grateful to them for all their support. He is hoping to raise awareness about the importance of organ donation and raise funds to help transplant patients by riding his motorcycle from John O'Groats to Lands' End.

He said, "To save more lives, we need more people to register for organ donation. I will continue to raise awareness of the chronic lung condition I had and hopefully effect change in the research and the lives affected by this disease."

The road for a transplant patient can be a long and arduous one with multiple appointments and tests for weeks and months, sometimes years.


The multimillion-pound Edmonds Transplant Centre Birmingham is due to open in early 2025 and will greatly improve transplant patients' treatment journeys by providing them with everything they need pre-op and post-op, all in one place.

The new centre, funded by Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham Charity will become a national centre of excellence for organ transplantation. Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham carries out all the major organ transplants – heart, lung, liver and kidney, headed up by world-leading surgeons and cutting-edge equipment. Edmonds Transplant Centre Birmingham will further cement the city's reputation as a leader in organ transplants.

Clinical Care Consultant, Nick Murphy, explained how the new centre will streamline patient journeys, saying that, "Patients can come in and see their physician, the surgeon, the transplant coordinators, their psychologist and their dietician all on the same day, and in one location. This will take away a huge amount of stress for patients and therefore speed up their recovery time."

The Edmonds Transplant Centre Birmingham will also provide a single place where patients can spend time together and build up support networks. We are very grateful to A Edmonds and Co Ltd and the Garfield Weston Foundation for their amazing contributions which will have a huge impact on our transplant patients.

Mark Edmonds, from A Edmonds and Co Ltd, came to see the building work at the new centre and told us, "We were very pleased to see the development of the Edmonds Transplant Centre Birmingham and grateful to QEHB Charity and UHB Trust for spending the time to update us and show us around the new site. We were impressed with the progress, which seemed far greater than we had expected. It looks great so far, and we can't wait to see it fully developed and open to patients in the new year."



Receiving an organ transplant is life-changing and we want to help make that journey as easy as possible for patients and their families. The new centre will allow patients to visit just one area of the hospital, bringing all the specialist care to them in one place, including pre-transplant consultations, additional fitness classes before surgery, patient support groups, and rehabilitation classes after surgery. It will also be home to world leading surgeons and researchers at the forefront of research and technology improving the success of transplantation.

to keep our doors open if it wasn't for our amazing donors, like the Warwickshire Freemasons. Thanks to their generous donations and support, we can continue offering a home away from away to our military patients and their families when they need it most.

Stan Bowley Trust

We want to celebrate the amazing Stan Bowley Trust and say a big thank you for its incredible, ongoing support over the last 12 years. The Trust was instrumental in helping us bring CyberKnife, a £3.5million state-of-theart radiotherapy machine, to Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham in 2013.

The Stan Bowley Trust began as a website which aimed to share the story of Alan 'Stan' Bowley, a Staffordshire Police Sergeant who was diagnosed with an inoperable tumour on his pancreas. His family raised the money for him to travel to the US to receive CyberKnife treatment. CyberKnife is a state-of-art radiotherapy machine which uses high doses of radiation to submillimetre accuracy, meaning it is able



to treat small well-defined tumours located in difficult-to-reach parts of the body.
Sadly, Stan is no longer with us,

but his family believe that CyberKnife gave him a second chance and three more years of quality time with his wife and children. The Stan Bowley Trust has continued to support CyberKnife over the years by organising various fundraising activities and events, including its annual ball. Thanks to its support we have been able to progress with new trials and treat even more patients, including children with brain tumours. The support and donations from the Stan Bowley Trust have significantly impacted the way we are able to treat cancer patients. helping us to change and save lives.


