Whilst there are still tough times ahead, UHB Charity is looking towards the future, with hope of brighter days ahead. We will continue to support our staff, patients, and families in whatever way we can, going 'over and above' to improve patient experience for our local community.

Going forward, we have plans to refurbish areas of our hospitals, with particular focus on our Paediatric services across our hospitals. This includes the Children's Outpatients department at Solihull Hospital, and the Children's Ward at Good Hope









Hospital. We want to make it brighter and more inviting for our youngest patients, taking the stress and anxiety away from visiting our hospitals. The refurbishments will involve complete redecoration of these areas, the installation of child-appropriate wall-art, and new comfortable seating and sensory equipment for children and their siblings.

At Heartlands Hospital we are currently raising funds to provide a home from home for families of children receiving treatment at the hospital. Heartlands Hospital treats 76,000 children every year, treating some of the most poorly children across the West Midlands, with many making return visits, or having long stays in hospital for emergency procedures. UHB Charity wants to fund a home from home that will allow parents. guardians, and family members to stay, free of charge, in a comfortable environment close to the hospital, close to their child.

We are incredibly excited to launch some of our new projects across the hospital sites and continue supporting our staff, patients, and families after what has been an incredibly difficult year for us all.

Pride in opening

On Monday 19 April,
University Hospitals
Birmingham (UHB) Charity
was extremely proud to
unveil the brand-new Midwifery
Led Unit (MLU) at Good Hope
Hospital! This £1 million project
will support new mothers and
babies, giving women the
reassurance that they are in the
safest place they can be when
delivering their new baby.

Having a baby is an incredibly special time in parents' lives and in the build up to the delivery date, the bond between mother and midwife becomes extraordinarily strong as the midwife supports the mother throughout her pregnancy. More recently, there has been an increase in demand for Midwifery Led Units where the midwife assists with a natural birth. The MLU will provide women with a 'home from home' like experience, so that women feel safe, comfortable and in control of the birth of their baby. This £1 million investment into maternity services at Good Hope Hospital will have a direct benefit

on the mother, baby, and families.



The new unit is home to four new spacious and beautifully decorated birthing suites [Lavender Suite, Camomile Suite, Eucalyptus Suite, Jasmine Suite], two of which include birthing pools. They also incorporate brand new equipment such as birthing cubes, stargazer chairs and height adjustable cots to encourage family centred care and ensure everyone involved feels as comfortable as possible.

There are two new overnight rooms which will provide a home away from home for mothers, a family dining and lounge area and its own entrance, all creating a more relaxed and less clinical environment which will have a positive impact on mother and baby.

The maternity team at Good Hope Hospital has already seen the benefits of the MLU. Just hours after the unit opened, Hannah Stait and Tiago Estradas welcomed their first baby boy into the world - Joey Des Estradas.

The couple arrived on the unit on Monday afternoon, and were instantly mesmerised by the unit, feeling comforted by the soft lighting, calming imagery, and non-clinical surroundings. Hannah and Tiago were shown round the MLU, and asked to choose which room they would like stay in. The pair chose the Jasmine birthing suite, as not only is this home to one of the amazing birthing pools, but the suite is blue, which they felt was very appropriate as they knew they were having a little boy.

Speaking to the new parents about

their experience on the MLU, Hannah said: "It was nothing like I ever expected. As soon as I got onto the MLU and into the birthing



suite, I was so excited, and I could not believe it. It was just such a lovely experience! We had music, the birthing pool, and the birthing ball - I was having the time of my life! I felt really privileged, I kept thinking how lucky we were, and





I never realised it was going to be this amazing."

New father Tiago said: "The environment that has been created is so nice. It felt almost like a holiday or night away! We feel lucky. The home-like feel of the MLU made it feel really special and more natural and I did not panic at all. If Han had not been as comfortable as she was, it might have been scarier, but we were really relaxed."

The unit has also been special for the maternity services and midwives at Good Hope Hospital. Lindsay Fitzgerald and Beth Bliss were the midwives who delivered Baby Joey. Lindsay said "I had been looking forward to working on the MLU for a long time. I helped fundraise for it back in 2019 by abseiling down a nine-storey building in Birmingham! And I must say it has been very worth the wait, the unit is absolutely amazing. It is everything that we imagined it to be and more. The birthing suites have lovely features

such as pull-down double beds, mood lighting and murals on the walls making the unit a lovely, calming environment for women who choose to give birth here."

Fundraising Manager at University Hospitals Birmingham Charity, Laura Power said: "UHB Charity is so pleased with the new Midwifery Led Unit, it looks amazing, better than we could ever have imagined! We are so grateful to Friends of Good Hope for their generous donation of £150.000 towards the unit. and all the support of the local community for making this project possible. With over 3,500 babies born each year at Good Hope Hospital, the MLU will mean more mothers will be able to benefit from the support of midwives in a specialist unit. It is wonderful to hear that the MLU provided our first couple with such an amazing experience. We wanted the MLU to provide that home-like birthing experience and we are so glad that is how Hannah and Tiago felt!"








George and Florence continue their fundraising mission

battles Covid



The money raised by his fiancée, Sarah Bramley, Phil's daughter, Olivia, and some of his lifelong friends. Sarah said: "After Phill passed away, I was overwhelmed with the number of messages I received from people telling me how much Phill had shaped their lives and what a special man he was. It was then that I decided I must do something to honour Phill and the extraordinary difference he made to so many people."

The money will be used to purchase 12 INR testing machines. The machines allow patients to monitor themselves at home, rather than having to go into hospital every two to three weeks. Thanks to Sarah and Olivia the machines will make a real and lasting difference to patients here at Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham.

Family take on epic challenge for Fisher House

The Osborne family from Herefordshire is taking on a fundraising challenge that will see them cover the distance from Land's End to John O'Groats in aid of Fisher House, the military home from home at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham (QEHB).

Dad Matt, a retired Army Major, was due to receive a liver transplant last year. It was at this time that Matt found out about Fisher House, UHB Charity's military home from home that offers free accommodation to military patients and their families. Over the next five weeks, Matt's wife and mother were both able to stay, free of charge, at Fisher House. Matt said: "It was touch-and-go for a while after my surgery, so this was a stressful time for Leanne and my mother. Fisher House meant that they had nothing to worry about in terms of expensive hotel bills, or long commutes from Herefordshire to Birmingham.

To say thank you, the Osborne Family has raised an incredible £445 for Fisher House!





This June celebrate with UHB Charity as Fisher House turns eight! Situated on the Queen Elizabeth Hospital site, Fisher House is our home away from home for both serving and ex-military patients, and their families. The house offers free accommodation allowing families to stay as long as they need whilst their loved ones recover in hospital. With 18 spacious bedrooms and large, welcoming communal areas, the house presents a supportive and caring environment without compromising the resident's independence. The house is designed for people of all abilities with an open plan set up, wide corridors and wheelchair accessible lifts.

> Since opening its doors in 2013, Fisher House has cared for over five thousand families. To sustain this level of care we

need your continued support and donations. We are eternally thankful to the organisations, charities, companies and individuals who continue to support Fisher House.

Expertly managed by Patrick Hogan and his team, Fisher House also allows patients to spend time with their loved ones away from the wards. With just a short walk to the hospital, the house eliminates long commutes and financial stresses for families by offering a supportive environment surrounded by those who understand.

Patrick Hogan, House Manager said "It's with great pride we've reached eight years old, enabling over 5,500 people to spend time


close to their loved ones whilst being treated in QEHB. It's a big team effort from all concerned, who always remain fully committed to Fisher House. **Donations** however

It costs the charity £25 a night for a family to stay at Fisher House, a small amount that makes a huge difference. It allows families to live in a stress-free environment and be a short distance away from their loved ones.

Fundraising Manager, Cathryn Worth said "Fisher House is entirely charity funded and receives no MOD or Government funding. We are incredibly grateful to all those who support the funding of the house."

In 2013, Dave Watson's life changed forever when he stepped on a hidden IED bomb whilst on patrol in Afghanistan. The former Scots Guardsman was only 23 and fully conscious throughout the horrific ordeal. As a result of the explosion he lost both legs as well as his right arm and died three times whilst being air-lifted to safety.

Now a triple amputee, Dave hasn't let his injuries define his pathway in life. He has two daughters with his wife Becky. He's a motivational speaker, an ambassador for Fisher House as well as an athlete. We caught up with Dave to talk about his story and the importance of Fisher House.

When and why did you join the military?

I joined in 2007. My grandad's brother was in the Scots Guards. I wanted to keep the tradition in the family.

What did your role involve?

After six months of difficult training, I passed. People had doubts I wouldn't last 5 minutes. I then went to London for ceremonial duties. I stood outside Buckingham Palace, met the Royal Family, danced with The Queen. It was an amazing experience.

I then went to Battalion. It was bigger. They became brothers. You look after each other 24/7. We started completing our pre-op training for Afghanistan. I'd never done anything like that before.

How did you feel about leaving for Afghanistan?

Lots of things go through your head when you're going to a war zone. I had to forget everything and put my job first.

Did you have a bad gut feeling the day of your accident?

Yes. All the locals were acting strange. Then our radio said we were surrounded.

We were wading through a stream, my mate slipped. I stopped to help. I heard a click. My weapon hit me in the face at 100mph. The blast threw me 15 feet in the air. I landed underwater. My life flashed before my eyes.

I was dragged out. They said 'Dave don't look down.' My legs were gone. My arm was dangling from its tendons. I knew nothing could save it. I died three times at 37.000 feet.

Any advice to others going through life-changing injuries?

Never give up, keep pushing forward. There is always something you can do. You can't spell disability without ability. Ability is going to be with you all the time focus on it push on and smash it.

How would you describe Fisher House?

Fisher House is absolutely amazing, it's a home away from home, that's what it's here for. Families can go to the hospital to see their loved ones, when they come out and walk through the front door, that gets left behind. You can relax and clear your head. Each family helps each other out because you're all going through similar things. It's a constant circle. That's the good thing about Fisher House it keeps everyone's spirits high.

TINA'S HOME IN MEMORY O

If, over the last 17 years, you have made a donation to the charity or, indeed as a member of staff requested funding from the charity, you may well have come across Tina. When Mike Hammond came on board as Chief Executive and re-launched the charity back in 2009, Tina was just coming back to work from maternity leave which made her our longest serving member of the charity team. She was an integral part of the team as the charity grew and a fountain of knowledge on all things charity and grants.

The charity team would joke that the fundraisers would raise the money and Tina would just spend it but her role was so much more than that. In



recent years Tina's focus as **Grants Manager** was in ensuring all the requests coming into the charity met the correct criteria and identified appropriate funds crossing all the t's and dotting all the i's as she went. She also spent a lot of time ensuring the charity got the

best value for money whether she was purchasing cutting edge medical equipment or the more standard and routine items for the ward. She was shrewd, meticulous, efficient and professional everything you'd want from someone looking after the charity's grants to be but she was also the most caring, supportive member of staff with a wicked sense of humour and a memorable smile!

In 2018 Tina was diagnosed with cancer and found herself being treated by the teams she had spent years supporting professionally. Sadly in January this year Tina passed away.

Tina's family decided to set up a Tribute Fund in Tina's memory (tina-hales.muchloved.com) which also enabled donations to be collected for the charity. In deciding what to do with the funds raised in her memory the family thought it would be a fitting tribute to dedicate one of the charity's homes from home to Tina for the year and so we are proud to now have Tina's Home from Home. These home from homes are apartments and houses which offer free accommodation to those who have to travel to the hospital and require overnight accommodation.

They are kitted out as you would like a home to be and provide a safe space away from the hospital but within a 5 minute walk and are available for as long as required. For families who are travelling long distances or need to be close to the hospital these homes are incredibly important. In June 2020 12-year-old Dennis Morgan, from mid-Wales, was diagnosed with stage four Hodgkin's lymphoma. This devastating diagnosis turned his family's lives upside down, and he urgently started a course of cancer treatment at the QEHB.

Dennis, his mom Amanda, and his dad Guy, were all able to stay at the Homes from Home during his radiotherapy treatment.

Amanda said: "Dennis is autistic, and so for him the prospect of staying somewhere unfamiliar was worrying. But the flat is beautiful, and we felt so at



home there right from the start. It was great that he had his own bedroom so that he could spend time on his own, on his computer." "This would usually have been a four-hour round trip which would have had a huge physical and financial cost for us as a family."

Dennis' radiotherapy treatment was successful and just eight months on from his diagnosis he is looking forward to the



Maren Ailkja - Day shift nurse

Fam-Arrive at work early to ensure the allocation for the day shift is done so that the nurse in charge of the night shift is not too late home with up to 32 babies to tell me about!

11am-Go to the Postnatal Ward to administer antibiotics to any potential septic babies who are well enough to remain with their mothers. Today there was only one baby so it didn't take

The midwife on the delivery suite phones to update me there is an expectant mother of triplets who needs to deliver today. I discuss this with the consultant and we make plans to move the babies around so we can accommodate the delivery.

2pm-Quick bite to eat. Waiting for a phone call on the triplet

4pm-Delivery suite tell us they're going to deliver the triplets, this is no easy feat and I have to send three nurses and two

Excellent teamwork! Staff stayed well beyond their shift to

5pm-Back to the postnatal ward to administrate antibiotics. I feet like I'm abandoning the nurses down here but it's so busy, there is no one else free to go.

I feed two babies as the nurse is helping with the triplets. I get them out for skin to skin with their parents and chat to them about how well their babies are doing.

6.30-7pm-1 go round each room to get an update on the babies conditions to hand over to the night team. I thank everyone for the great teamwork which has got us through the shift.

Dear Diary is our new page to showcase a typical day in the life of our incredible NHS workers. We caught up with the Neonatal Unit at Heartlands Hospital who gave their account from a day shift to a night shift.

Leanne Macdonald - Night shift nurse

7.30pm- Tonight I'm caring for one special care and one high dependency baby. There have been no issues overnight thankfully. Each baby is on a two hourly nasogastric feed and both like to drop their oxygen levels occasionally to keep

4am-The midwife informs us that a preterm lady is delivering. I go to the delivery suite with doctors to assist with me on my toes! the resuscitation. I help bring the baby back to the unit and

In between feeding the babies, I'm reading my 'Newborn Life help to stabilise. Support Manual as every four years we have to have a written and practical exam on resuscitation.


5am-Documenting everything on the system and writing up

covid has undoubtedly made an already stressful time for our parents even worse. As nurses, we have been there to support parents and listen to their concerns. We make very good listeners and I think parents have been very grateful for our support throughout the pandemic.
