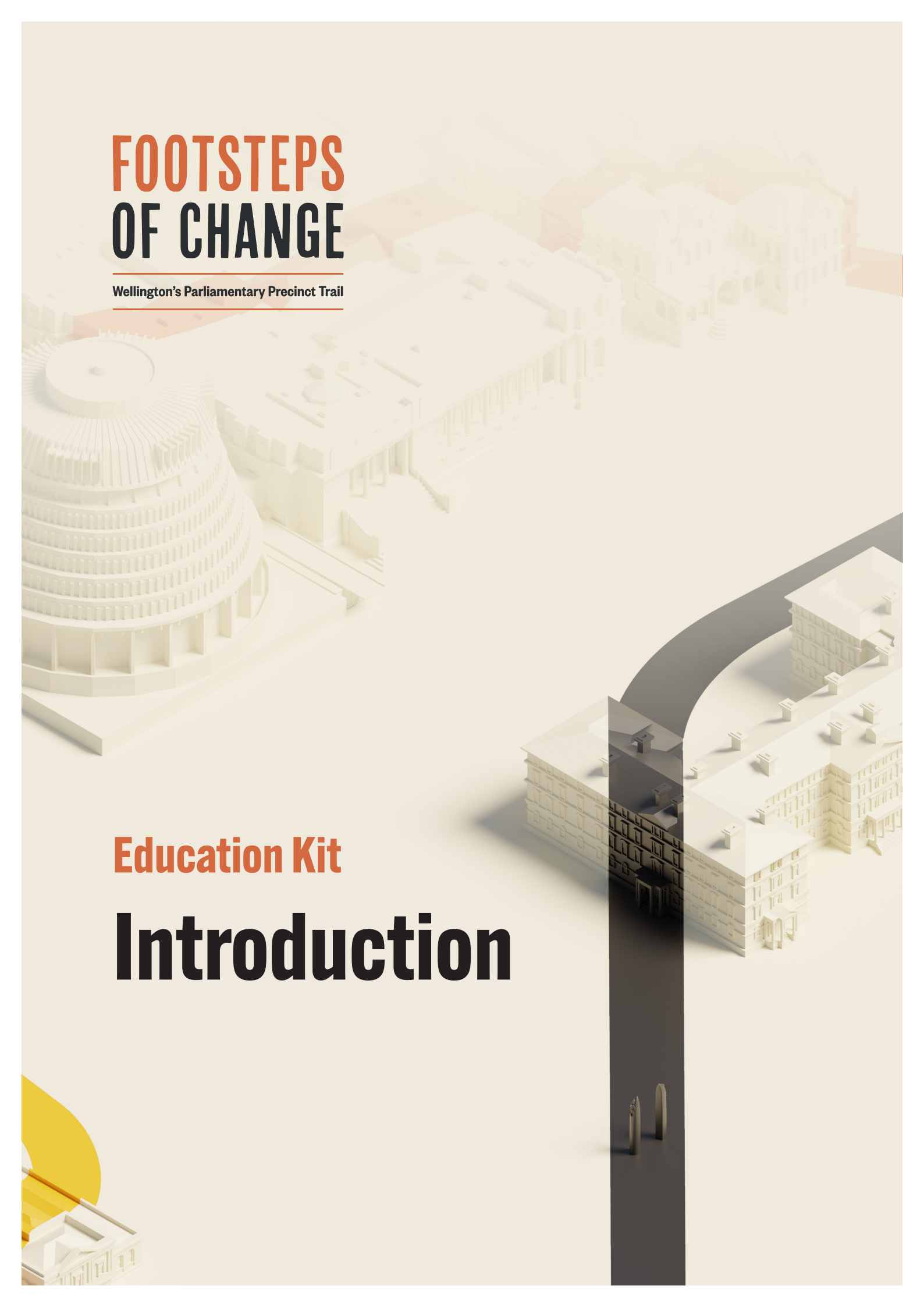

Education Kit

Introduction

These education kits accompany Footsteps of Change, a self-guided tour through Wellington's Parliamentary Precinct. They are designed to help teachers use the precinct as a place for exploring civics, citizenship, and the stories of our democratic history.

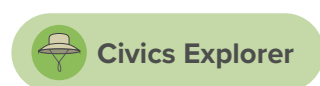
Each kit focuses on a different theme or aspect of the Footsteps of Change experience. This is a buildable resource that can be tailored to the specific needs of your classroom.

There are two kits available:

- The **Parliamentary Precinct Kit** – focuses on teaching historic locations within the Parliamentary Precinct.
- The **Civic Events Kit** – focuses on teaching a selection of significant civic events from New Zealand's civic past.

Who are these kits suited for?

These kits are designed for a range of learners. Suggested age groups are indicated with these characters:



Best suited to younger, primary-age students. These activities focus on first encounters with the topics and build curiosity, observation, and discussion.



Best suited to intermediate, secondary, and some older primary school students. These activities have a greater focus on analysis and thinking critically.

Using Footsteps of Change as a teaching tool

Footsteps of Change is a self-guided trail around the Parliamentary Precinct, developed by Locales and WellingtonNZ, with input from Te Ātiawa representatives and Chief Historian Neil Atkinson from Manatū Taonga Ministry for Culture and Heritage.

The tour explores the histories of key locations around the precinct while highlighting Aotearoa New Zealand's civic past. It's a unique resource that looks at the history of our capital city in an entirely new way.

How to use the tour

The trail is accessed via a Storymapp® – a printed souvenir map that visitors can use as they explore the precinct. QR codes on the map link to a mobile guide that features an audio tour, 360° illustrated historical reconstructions, and articles supported by archival sources.

There are several ways to use *Footsteps of Change* in the classroom:

- The mobile guide is a useful resource for taking students to the Parliamentary Precinct.
- For students outside of Wellington, you can still explore the topics with the mobile guide or through the *Footsteps of Change* website.
